Kentville News.

The old house at the head of Church St., formerly occupied by J. L. Neary till partly destroyed by fire, has been put on blocks ready for being removed.

Gaspereau.

The ordinance of baptism was administered last Sabbath, at Gaspereau, to eleven persons, in the presence of 300 or 400 people. Rev. Isa. Wallace, general missionary, at the request of the pastor officiated, and afterwards delivered an impressive discourse.

Black River.

Mr Wier met with a serious loss on the 2d inst. His dwelling house was totally consumed by fire. The most of the furniture and goods in the lower part was rescued. Only recently he had spent considerable upon the building making it very comfortable. There is much sympathy for the family in their loss.

A disgraceful scene occurred here last week. Mr Marchant Benjamin and Douglas Davidson came to the house of Mr Harris Schofield in a state of intoxication. Davidson asked for a room where he might lie down, as he was feeling unwell. His companion, hearing of this, proceeded to punish him for the act with kicks and blows, when he was put out of the house and the door closed against him. He, however, attempted to force his way through an opening he made in the window. The son of Mr Schofield sought to prevent him, and inflicted a dangerous wound upon his head. His condition is now said to be critical. Benjamin had, in the melee previous to his ejection, kicked the boy and thrown a younger child against the stove, which caused a wound from which the liquor is said to have been obtained at Port Williams, but the young man had got an additional supply on their way in the shape of cider.

Encountered a Hurricane.

The Windsor barque Lennox, Capt. Harris, bound to Sydney, N.S.W., from New York, put into Halifax on Friday evening for repairs. She sailed from New York on April 19th, and all went well until the 25th, in lat. 32.09, lon. 62.31, when the wind, which had been blowing strong from the southwest, shifted suddenly to the northwest, blowing with hurricane force.

The barque was hove down for some time. Her fore and mainmast were carried away, the lower foremast sprang, upper and lower foretopsails and mainmast blown away, foremast split, and spanker boom and mizzen boom broken. The mainmast was carried away above the shroud hole. The wheel was also broken by the falling spars.

The Lennox is 1425 tons, and is owned by the Bennett Smith estate, of Windsor. —H. Chronicle.
