Honkers, balloons and flags were distributed to the youngsters, and amidst a deafening noise of horns and lusty cheering, to which was added the clanging and whooping of the bells and horns of the fire trucks, the cars moved off for Topsail.

By way of Military Road, Duckworth and Water Streets, arriving at the Topsail residence of His Honor Mayor Cook, where they were given a hearty welcome and refreshments and treated to ice cream. Under the guidance of Mr. Barton, games, races and various amusements were organized, and the grotesque "stunts" of Charlie Chaplin furnished untold mirth. The Mount Cashel Band, under the leadership of Mr. Arthur Bailey, furnished plenty of lively music.

At six o'clock tea was served in real camp style. S. S. Sagona Reports Improvements In Fishery

There has been a marked improvement in the codfishery along Labrador side of the Straits of Belle Isle of late, is the report brought here by the S. S. Sagona, Capt. R. H. Andrews, which ship reached Curling at 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon. The ship left here on the previous trip and experienced fine weather northward until Brig Bay was reached on Monday evening when she encountered fog. It continued foggy all the way from there to Battle Hr., which port she reached on Tuesday evening. On the return trip fog continued westward to Chimney Tickle, but from there on fine weather was experienced throughout the remainder of the trip. Fishermen are doing well with codfish with hook and line from Red Bay to West St. Modiste At Forteau they get good catches daily. Fish is no so plentiful at Bonne Esperance, Whiteley's crew get thirty-five quintals daily. Herring are fairly plentiful all along the coast. There is also an improvement along Newfoundland coast from Bonne Bay to Lark Harbour.—Western Star.
