CUTTING-OUT.

There is a certain delicate and desperate species of naval service, in which British seamen are poculiarly distinguished as able, and frequently successful, professional operators: it is called cutting-out. This very rarely takes place on any extended scale, and it is equally rare for any large-force of men to be employed upon it. As a general rule, cutting-out is 'performed without much premeditation or nice calculation of risks it is usually planned by some young spirited officer in command of a trigate, or small ficilia, and undertaken almost impromptu by himself and other daring naval aspirants, as much from a feverish resolve to distinguish themselves, and earn promotion by doing something, as from any other motive. It is rarely we find veteran efficers of high rank engaging in such desperate adventures, unless there is a very important stake to be gained—some object either of extraordinary intrinsic value, or else likely to lead to commensurate advantages. It is a service sui generis, requiring particular faculties, distinct and different from those essential in other branches of the service. Young, dashing fellows, of dauntless bravery—
