

BIG EXCURSION OF IMMIGRANTS

TRAINLOAD OF SETTLERS FROM ONTARIO COMING IN APRIL

Greater immigration into Alberta this spring than ever before in the history of the province is foretold by the Hon. Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture, who returned to Edmonton last night after an absence of three weeks in the east.

Mr. Marshall informed the Bulletin that the inquiries made at the Toronto office of the Alberta Government by interested sections have been so numerous that C. S. McCulloch, the agent there, is arranging for a special excursion train for April 4th, which will run right through to this province.

The whole trainload will be made up of bona-fide settlers. Many settlers are already passing through the Winnipeg office on their way to Alberta. That the number is greatly in excess of that of the same period last year is the statement of E. J. Foley, the government's agent at Winnipeg.

Shipment of Cattle. To place before the railway commission the need of better provisions for the shipment of cattle, was Mr. Marshall's chief mission on his trip to Ottawa.

Numerous protests have been made to the department of agriculture recently by dealers in the stock against the delays in providing cars for cattle and in the hauling of them when loaded. Mr. Marshall discussed the question before the commission along with Dr. Rutherford, the Dominion live stock commissioner, and presented a draft of the regulations required.

The commission agreed that new regulations should be passed but will not be ready to approve until the railways have had an opportunity to present their side of the case.

Several matters relating to agriculture in the province of Alberta were taken up by Mr. Marshall with the Hon. Sydney Fisher, minister of agriculture in the Dominion cabinet, and arrangements were made that certain kinds of work should be carried on co-operatively.

Mr. Marshall will go to Inland tomorrow to be present at the closing of the short course school in agriculture there on Saturday.

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AGREE TO BOOST SALARIES

Calgary Presbytery Will Give \$1000 Missionaries An Increase.

Calgary, March 8.—At this morning's session of the annual meeting of the Calgary Presbytery, an important step was taken in motion to raise the salaries of those serving in the Home Mission fields.

The report on the motion for union especially in its favor, was passed by a vote of 13 to 4. Two votes were not allowed by the Presbytery.

After six days spent in conference the mine workers and operators are as far from arriving at an agreement as they were at the start.

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BIG COAL FIND AT ST. ALBERT

BOOM HAS ALSO STRUCK PORT SASKATCHEWAN DURING LAST FEW DAYS.

Reports received in the city last night by the Bulletin from St. Albert indicate that a valuable strike of hard coal, similar to anthracite has been made there, yesterday great excitement prevailed in the town as a result of the news and the residents look for great and speedy development if the find turns out as expected.

The discovery was made on the Raymond, Brudhol property which comprises River-Lots 52 and 54 about half a mile west of the town.

Property values would also rise, manufacturers would be attracted in case of amalgamation. Wholesalers also, who were now locating in Edmonton, would be induced to settle on the south bank of the river.

As to building business, the best car service had never affected business and there was no reason to suppose that close communication would hurt the city's interests.

Alderman Tipton stated that he had refrained hitherto from speaking on this subject, but felt it his duty now to speak in favor of amalgamation for several reasons.

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BALFOUR ATTACKS THE AMBASSADOR

London, March 8.—Every time reciprocity is mentioned in parliament there is a warm passage at arms. Mr. Balfour, leader of the Opposition, and Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, had a brush today in the House of Commons over Ambassador Bryce.

Mr. Balfour wanted to know what instructions had been sent to the ambassador and why the British manufacturers had not been consulted during the negotiations between the United States and Canada.

The tendency would be, the Opposition leader said, for the Americans to put pressure on Canada to raise the duties against the United Kingdom.

Mr. Bryce, who is warmly defended by the foreign secretary, said that he had not been consulted because both parties to the agreement were desirous of secrecy.

Mr. Bryce's reports on the subject of the reciprocity negotiations were issued in a "white paper" this evening. The most interesting communication is under date of January 22, the day following the conclusion of the agreement.


