Home Rule Campaign.

Yesterday we pointed out that the passing of the Parliament Bill cleared the way for the passing of a Home Rule Bill within the next two or three years. A message from London to-day conveys the intelligence that the two great parties at home are preparing for a struggle on the Home Rule issue, and that both parties are preparing for a big campaign on that issue. That the enactment of some such statute as is embodied in the Parliament Bill would be a necessary preliminary to the successful passage of a Home Rule Bill has been evident to everybody. Sir Gladstone saw it eighteen years ago and was desirous of forcing on the issue in spite of his advanced age and increasing infirmities. The Nationalists' support of the Liberal party in their fight against the House of Lords has been based on that assumption. The Tory campaign of denunciation of Premier Asquith as the helot of John Redmond, and of denunciation of the latter as the American Dollar Dictator, is based on the same assumption. Lord Dunsany, the Irish Unionist and advocate of Devolution, says in a work just published:—"Constitutional reform is desirable both for its material and moral effect. It is necessary to ensure better government. It is necessary as an

expression of nationality, and a true sense of nationality finding a legitimate mode of expression is necessary for the creation and development of those civic virtues without which Ireland cannot progress. Ireland cannot be content without some political recognition of her nationality; nor, save under the stimulus of control over her own affairs, can the people of Ireland regain the self-confidence and energy necessary for industrial development in agricultural and other trades."

He also added that—"The people of Ireland are not likely, under any circumstances, to abandon their political claims. If they did, I should deeply regret it, for I do not believe that under the legislative Union as it stands, real prosperity and progress is possible."

Geneva, August 5. — An exciting chase after a murderer, across a spur of the Mont Blanc range, took place recently, and the fugitive was finally arrested and handcuffed at a height of 7,700 ft. by gendarmes and Alpinists.
Three young Italian workmen were repairing the Alpine hut at Rosalire, near the summit of the Tournette, a mountain near Geneva, when two of them, named Dielemino and Guelpa, quarrelled. The former drew a knife and stabbed his companion, who died almost immediately.
Dielemino then fled across the mountain in the direction of the Swiss frontier, with the object of reaching Geneva. Two Alpinists, who had witnessed the murder, abandoned their excursion and hastened down to Thones to inform the police. Two gendarmes thereupon started in pursuit of the murderer, accompanied by the Alpinists.
Meanwhile, Dielemino had descended the Tournette, and, after crossing the valley, began the ascent of the more difficult Col de Montremont. Owing to the great heat, the pursuers were at a disadvantage, for the fugitive proved an expert climber. Moreover, he left the ordinary paths and risked his life among precipices in order to gain on his pursuers.
Finally, the murderer showed signs of exhaustion, and he sat down on a rock to rest. The gendarmes drew their revolvers when they came within range and threatened to shoot him unless he surrendered. Thereupon Dielemino allowed himself to be handcuffed and led to Thones.



For a 'World Alphabet' Wireless

A Bill Now Pending Before United States Congress.
Washington, Aug. 7.—A congress of nations is to adopt a "World Alphabet" is set forth in a bill introduced by Representative Jackson of Kansas. Mr. Jackson wants the President to invite all nations to send delegates to Washington 2, 1912, to consider the possibilities and feasibility of promulgating all elementary sounds of the human voice which may be used in forming an speech or expression of ideas and of formulating a graphic sound notation of alphabet for all such sounds, which alphabet shall be adapted to the use of every language, dialect and form of human vocal expression and shall be suitable for writing, printing, engraving, and other forms of presentation. In presenting this "unprecedented scientific alphabet," Representative Jackson particularly asks that the views of all "linguists, phoneticians, philologists, lexicographers, orthographers, orthographers, translators, teachers of languages, artists, oculists, physicians, anatomists, stenographers, artists, typographers, linotypists, tenoraphers, phonographers and type foundries" be taken into consideration.
