Wreck of the Schr. Golden Rod

TREPASSEY, To-day.
The fishing schooner Golden Rod, Farrel, master and owner, belonging to Bay Du Nord, Fortune Bay, during a dense fog yesterday became a total wreck near Baker's Point, Western Shore, entrance to Trepassay. The crew of 10 men had a very narrow chance of their lives and saved nothing whatever. They escaped in their dories by a miracle as a very heavy sea was on. She had 60 quintals of fish on board. The schooner was partly insured. The authorities are looking after the crew who will be sent home by the Portia.

Portia's Fishery News.

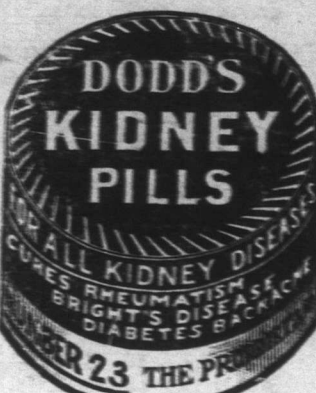
From Captain Fitzpatrick of the Portia, we learn that from Bonaville Bay all along the coast until you come to Cape St. Mary's and Cape Pine, there is not a codfish to be had and what is seldom seen at this season of the year there is absolutely no belt. At the latter place a number of Placenta Bay and St. Mary's Bay boats have fair catches which they sold to the Gordon Pew Co's. schooner which is buying fish salted in Trepassay Bay. She has now equal to between 70 and 800 qts. dry after a week's stay in the bay. Along the Southern Shore the boats are doing as well as in fact better than they did at any time during the summer. Monday night Fermuse presented a spectacle which would charm the heart of any true Newfoundland fisherman. All the stages were aglow with light while the big catches taken that afternoon were being split, headed and put away in the salt bulks and the prospects for a good voyage there are very bright indeed as the Gordon Pew Co's. vessel in Trepassay Bay is buying \$5.20 for 112 lbs. green which is equal to \$5.70 net equal or in effect \$5.30 buying prices plus making and shipping 40 cents, while large merchantable in St. John's brings \$5.50 per quintal. So that it happens that the Gordon Pew Co's. price net is higher by 20 cents per quintal than the figure quoted here in the city for large merchantable. The Gordon Pew Co's. agent says that his only fear is that he will not get enough fish to buy. He will take all he can get and will pay a fair price equal to that which is paid for the highest price in St. John's.

Hollywood En Fete.

The rain yesterday morning did not interfere with the success of the Hollywood Garden Party as much as was expected. A train from the city went out at 11 a.m. after the rain held up, taking a large number of city visitors. Others went by the 2.30 p.m. train and were put off at Hollywood. Owing to the ground being so damp the programme of outdoor sports had to be dropped. A dance was held in the Star of the Sea Hall and afforded much enjoyment. The T. A. Band rendered the music in their well known style, and the dance music was played by Messrs. O'Grady and Gummerson after supper had been served. Rev. Fr. Donnelly and his assistants did everything possible to make the event enjoyable. The city visitors came home by train at 5 o'clock this morning.

Several Places Flooded

The downpour of rain of yesterday morning flooded several private houses and business places in the city. Amongst the latter were the basement of Mr. Patk. Butlers restaurant on Water Street, where cases of onions, barrels of potatoes and other foods to the amount of \$30, were destroyed. At one time during the morning there was three feet of water in Mr. Butler's basement. The basement of Rankin & Coy. and Mr. Geo. Langmead, were also flooded and considerable damage was done there. A river of water poured down on A.H. Murray's premises but fortunately escaped down through holes in the wharf, but for which much fish in the stores must have been damaged.

"Fair Time."

Speaking of fishery operations in Fortune Bay, Capt. Fitzpatrick of the Portia, says that at Hermitage Bay particularly, and from Port aux Resques to Fortune Bay, the fishery is now at a stand still and will be so until the 20th of the month. The phrase "fair time" arises from the fact that the old English firms operating on the West Coast always gave their employees a holiday extending from September 5th to the 25th, and during this period no work of any kind was done nor were any fish caught. The 20 days were given up to amusements, etc., and during its continuance many marriages are solemnized. The people still religiously adhere to this custom and under no consideration will they work while this time lasts.

A Heavy Rain Storm.

As the weather report promised Tuesday, a heavy rain storm set in about 2 a.m. Wednesday with a very high southerly wind, and the rain descended in torrents. This continued till 10 a.m. yesterday, and during the morning the steeper streets of the city were ripped up into fissures by the rivers of water which ran over them; gullies and gratings in many places were choked and tons of sand and silt were brought down to the lower levels and had to be cleared away yesterday by the sanitary employees.

Created Consternation.

By the accommodation train which arrived here at 4.30 p.m. yesterday, a girl aged 17 years, of Tickle Harbor, arrived to go to the Lunatic Asylum. A police officer was with her and left her at the Station in the waiting room while he went in search of a cab to take her to the Institution. While the officer was absent the girl became violent, threw convulsions about the place and stamped all who were present. She then ran upstairs to some of the officers where she also created a sensation, and where she was captured by her guardian. She gave him much trouble while going there.

Ejected by Police.

Tuesday evening a party who was half seas over went to the S. A. Food Depot and created a disturbance. The officers present had considerable trouble with the man, and had eventually to call on Const. Tocher who quickly ejected him, and would have arrested the fellow but that he promised to go home and did so quickly to escape a night in No. 4.
