Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
From all parts of the Turkish Empire messages are arriving in Constantinople urging the Sultan to declare Holy War. Turkey has sent another note to the Powers asking for intervention, and offering to grant every reasonable concession to Italy. The Turkish forces in Tripoli have been withdrawn to the interior, where they will either wait the Italians, or, if possible, return the attack. Rumor has it that they are short of provisions, and may be forced to surrender.

LISBON, Oct. 9.
General Castro, the Minister of War, has resigned. The Government has asked the President to summon Parliament in order to secure consent to certain measures for the speedy trial and punishment of the conspirators in the attempted revolution. The Premier declared that the Republic up to the present has treated the monarchists with forbearance. Henceforth no indulgence will be shown.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
A startling item of war news comes from Constantinople to the effect that the Turkish Governor of St. Jean de Medea, on the Atlantic Coast, has informed the Porte that a vessel flying an Austrian flag, carrying an Italian officer and Italian soldiers, has been sunk by the forts, all on board perishing. An Italian warship then came up and bombarded the town, doing much damage to property.

BERLIN, Oct. 9.
A note from the Turkish Government asking whether they consider that the time has arrived to seek a basis for negotiations looking toward peace between Turkey and Italy, and under what conditions, has been presented to the Foreign Office. The note contemplates the cession of Tripoli to Italy under certain conditions.

CHIASSO, Oct. 9.
News from Turkey is of the gravest character. The Italians there are threatened with expulsion. If a massacre occurs, war in that quarter will again burst forth, as it will be almost impossible to prevent an attack on Albania, and that would mean the intervention of the other Powers.

LONDON, Oct. 9.
Telegrams posted at the Baltic Mercantile Shipping Exchange state that Turkey has declared grain a contraband of war, and the banks are refusing to finance shipments. The loading of vessels has been generally stopped.

Gloucester is Happy

Now that the cloud of reciprocity has been dispelled from the minds of the Gloucester business men, there ought to be a tuning up of our leading industry. For many months there has been a fear that in case of the acceptance of reciprocity by Canada the fishing business of Gloucester would suffer, and the probability of the pact being ratified was so strong that it has halted progress all along the line in this city. Now there can be no more fear. Reciprocity will not be heard from for many years. The United States cannot make any more overtures and Canada will not, and so the business men of this city who have felt that a trade agreement with Canada would force them to a readjustment of their affairs and perhaps the loss may make such provisions for the future as they will with full confidence, that the markets of the country are theirs and their success can only be measured by their own ability to make their goods attractive and market them. With this full confidence in the future there ought to be activity everywhere. If business has been halted by reason of this fear of Canadian competition, then, per contra, it ought to be renewed by the absolute removal of this fear. Now push things and make Gloucester hum.—Gloucester Times.

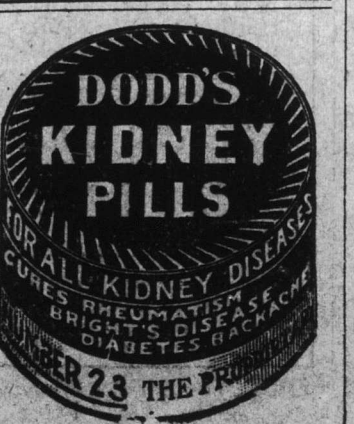

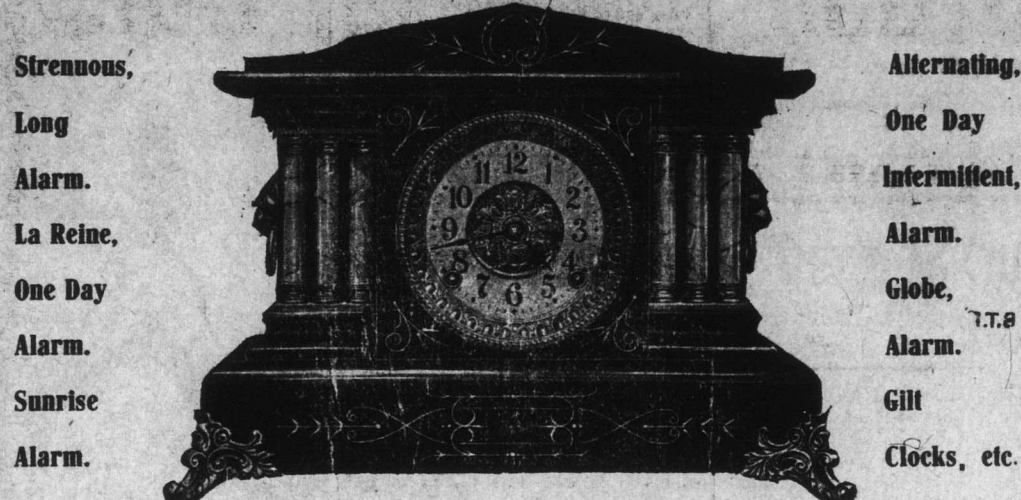
