Dear Sir—I have seen labored and
 heavy-phased reports of the Tory
 meeting at Conception Harbor and can
 assure you they are pure fabrications,
 written solely to bolster up a rotten

 paraded before the public to deceive
 them into believing that Woodford and
 Kennedy have any show of election.

Special to The Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
 Addressing a great Liberal meet-
 ing at Manchester, Churchill, First
 Lord of the Admiralty, expressed on
 behalf of the Admiralty and Navy
 keen sorrow for the Zepplin disaster;
 he then proceeded to comment
 upon the disquietude occasioned by
 expenditure upon naval armaments
 which he said was higher now than
 ever, while next year it would be
 higher still. The intention was to
 keep within its narrow limits, the
 serious misdirection of human en-
 ergy involved in this and other coun-
 tries by preparations for war, but if
 existing burdens were relieved, he
 continued, it must be by interna-
 tional agreement. Our relations with
 Germany, said Churchill, have been
 greatly improved without any loss to
 our friendships with other countries.
 The moment, therefore, ought to be
 favorable for our taking up the
 friendly reference of the question of
 a naval holiday, which is to be found
 in the German Chancellor's speech.
 We seem to have reached the point
 where the relations between Great
 Powers, however amicable they may
 have become, produce no effect, on
 warlike preparations.
