Household Notes

"All odds end here" is the inflexible rule of charcoal. If the charcoal is made red hot and then cooled before using its virtues are increased.

Borax is the best hairbrush cleaner. Add a teaspoonful of borax and a tablespoonful of soda to the water in which the hairbrush is to be washed. A change the children will appreciate is the bathing of mince-meat in tart shape. Simply line party pans with the pastry and then fill them, covering the top.

Tomato sauce is peculiarly good with baked beans. Cold baked beans covered with tomato sauce and baked in the oven till the whole is brown, is also a savory luncheon dish.

Make kitchen aprons with a flat seam, stitched on both sides, so there is no right or wrong, and time will be saved both in washing and in looking for the right side of the apron.

Oval-shaped gilt frames of the old-fashioned type are now being brought down from their hiding places and used to frame embroidery. In this manner they make handy trays.

A fruit jelly—apples, bananas and pineapple chopped and put into a foundation of gelatine, strawberry juice and hot water—makes a delicious salad, served on lettuce leaves.

It is an excellent idea to have a guest chest in the guestroom. It should contain emergency things—a nightgown, a bathrobe, slippers, soap, wash cloths, even a brand-new toothbrush.

When hot cloths are needed constantly in time of sickness, keep a colander full of them over a kettle half full of boiling water. Keep the kettle covered on the back of the range.

Colored goods should be ironed while damp and upon the wrong side. Delicate colors should not be subjected to a hot iron, because this fades them quite as much as hanging on the line in the sun.

A good luncheon dish is made of the macaroni and stewed tomatoes left from the night before. Heat them over again together and serve, or pour into a baking dish, cover with bread-crumbs and bake till brown.

In the Good Old Days.

Years ago an English country gentleman's home was "Liberty Hall" on Christmas Day.

All the tenants looked to the "big house" for their justifications, which varied according to the degree of their Lord. At daybreak on the eventful day all the tenants were gathered in the master's big hall, wither also were invited a sprinkling of the surrounding gentry. The strong beer was broached, and the black-jacks went plentifully about, with toast, sugar, nutmeg, and good Cheshire cheese.

If the hicken (the great sausage) was not boiled by daybreak, two young men took the cook by her arms and ran her round the market-place until she was ashamed of her laziness. The tables were never cleared, but remained constantly spread throughout the joyfull season with huge sirloins of beef, capons, turkeys, geese, plum-porridge, plum-puddings, and mince-pies.

All were welcomed, and ate heartily which gave rise to the saying, "Tis merry in the hall, when beads was wag all."

Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:

"Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficiency in the home. It is for this, amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after Jameson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.

I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, and its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter being employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewis, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov.8.11
