New Coal Mining Machine.

To Take the Place of Men—Owners
Wonder if New Epoch in the In-
dustry Has at Last Arrived.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 17.—Has a
new epoch come to the coal mining
industry? This was the question in
the minds of numerous coal operators
and others interested in coal mining
as a day or two since they watched
the operation of the first practical
coal mining machine—a machine
that stood the test of months, being
quietly operated in one of the large
mines of the Pittsburg district, turn-
ing out thousands of tons of commer-
cial coal direct from the face of the
coal seam, placing all the coal in
pile cars and keeping men out of the
jump to get the loaded cars out of the
way, when loaded.

For years such a machine has been
the dream of coal mining companies.
It has been needed to solve the in-
creasing problem of coal mining—
such as mine disasters, increasing
cost of labor, the growing expendi-
tures for mine equipment, miners,
homes at the mines, and countless
other outlays, of which the average
citizen has little realization.

The new mining machine is the de-
velopment of entirely new principles
in mechanical mining. It is the pro-
duct of H. A. Kuhn of Pittsburg, one
of the foremost mining and mechan-
ical engineers of the Pittsburg dis-
trict, who has spent more than ten
years in close application to the task
which he has at last completed, and
in the perfection of which he has ex-
pended a fortune in development
work. In the early years of his ex-
periments he spent his time discover-
ing fundamentals. He sought a
principle upon which a machine
would work. He made this a success,
and from it built an "economical,
practical, cheap and foolproof" ma-
chine, that does all the work of the
human miner—only it does it twenty
times as fast and 50 per cent. cheap-
er.

As the machine stands, it is a
structural steel frame, oblong in form
which rests on a steering truck
which rides on the floor of the mine.
It carries motors for operating the
cutting tools and the tools them-
selves, and it attacks the coal seam
in any position, moving up and down,
sideways or in any direction the coal
seam leads. Electricity or compres-
sed air can be used in operating the
motors, and so little power is required
that the cost for this item alone is
less than one per cent. per ton of coal
mined. One peculiar feature of the
machine that impresses the specta-
tor is that it seems to be fully as
flexible as the human coal miner. It
is estimated that the machine will
cut the cost of coal mining in half.

From the time that the machine
takes the coal from the seam, cuts
it, places it on a conveyor and loads
it in a pit car, no human hand touch-
es it. With twenty ordinary labor-
ers ten of the machines will produce
one thousand tons of coal a day, as
but two men are needed to operate
a machine.

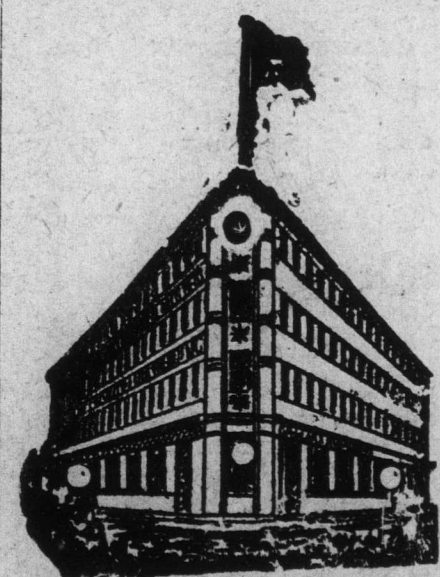
