### The Greek Situation.



It looks as if Greece is to become the centre of interest in the near future. There are signs that the Entente are preparing for big things there. A little time ago the news came that the Entente Navy had seized the Greek island of Milo. The situation and topography of this island are suggestive of Milo is conveniently situated in the routes between Gibraltar or Alexandria to either Saloniki or the ports of Athens. It is about 100 miles N.E. of Cape Malla, a promontory of the southern mainland of Greece and about 150 miles S.E. of the Bay of Phaleron, where the Germans allege the Entente Allies are landing troops to dominate the Greek capital. We cannot accept the statements, emanating from Berlin that the Entente are landing troops at the Bay of Phaleron and at the Piraeus, until it is confirmed from reliable British and French sources, as the natural intention would be that the Entente have determined to wage war on King Constantine with the object of deposing him, and it is improbable that they would take this drastic step unless they had strong assurances of support from the Greek army, and it should be remembered that the Greek army staff has all along been looked upon as favorable to Constantine's pro-Germanism. The seizure of Milo may be to form a naval base solely for the Saloniki campaign for which it is generally favorable. The contour of the island is that of a thick broken ring, the hollow forming a great harbor with a narrow entrance that can be protected by nets from hostile submarines.

The calling of the Greek Parliament and the proclamation of martial law may be an effort of King Constantine to line-up the Greek Parliament with him, if it is true that the Allies have landed forces at Phaleron and Piraeus. It should be remembered that the Venizelos party is not represented in this Parliament as the Venizelos party refrained from taking part in the last elections. The seizure of the island of Corfu and the use of it as a base for the Serbians has not the same significance. Corfu is an island close to the point of the extreme west of the Greek-Albanian frontier, and is conveniently situated for the Serbians to co-operate with the Italians to begin a march through Southern Albania towards Monastir against the Austrians. ### Charles Davis

**Fatally Injured.**

Workmen Fell From Bridge at Middle Musquodoboit and Met His Death.

Charles Davis, aged twenty-seven years, was accidentally killed at Elderbank, Middle Musquodoboit, yesterday afternoon. He was in the employ of McManus, the contractor, and was engaged at work on the bridge over Little River. He lost his balance, fell a distance of twenty-five feet, striking his head on the ice. He was so badly injured that he died two hours after the accident.

The deceased was unmarried and a native of Harbor Grace, Nfld., where his parents reside.
