## Death of Mr. Norman Munn.

A telegram was received in town last evening announcing the death of Mr. Norman Munn, of Harbor Grace. Mr. Munn was born in Harbor Grace fifty-three years ago, and was the second son of the veteran master mariner, Capt. John Munn, who was master of the clipper barque, Rothesay, built by Michael Kearney, and was famous for her quick passages. For years Mr. Munn conducted a large and prosperous fishing business at Sandy Islands, Labrador, and had several fine vessels of his own in which he shipped his fish to market. For many years he took a deep interest in agriculture, which he conducted on a large scale, and with profitable results. About twelve months ago, he was appointed to a responsible position in the Nfld. Shipbuilding Co.'s office, but his health failed and he had to retire. For some time he was in the General Hospital at St. John's undergoing treatment, but all was without avail and he returned to his home in Harbor Grace, where, notwithstanding all the care and attention of a loving wife and family, he passed peacefully away as recorded above. Mr. Munn was of a kind and courteous disposition, possessing marked business ability, and his loss will be felt by the people of Harbor Grace, amongst whom he was a general favorite. He was a Past Master of Masonic Lodge, Harbor Grace. The Telegram extends its deepest sympathy to the family in their bereavement.
