To-day's Messages.
CONVENTION DEADLOCKED.
 CHICAGO, June 11.
 The Republican National Convention in a ten hour continuous session to-day, cast four ballots in an unsuccessful effort to nominate a candidate for the Presidency. Wood, Lowden and Johnson led in the ballots in that order, but without enough at any time to give any one of them a majority of votes. On the fourth ballot the Wood strength had climbed up to three hundred and fourteen and a half votes; Lowden's strength to two hundred and eighty-nine, and Johnson's strength stood at one hundred and forty and a half. Herbert Hoover's maximum vote on the day's session was five votes, and Nicholas Murray-Butler's strength gradually decreased, much of it going to Lowden. Other votes were scattered among eight of the eleven candidates, who were placed in nomination. After the second ballot Lowden and Wood men, feeling discouraged by their steady gains, defeated a motion to adjourn, and held the convention in session for two more ballots. Wood and Lowden were making gains when the balloting closed. It was the first Republican Convention in many years which had gone past the third ballot before finding a Presidential nominee. For nearly ten straight hours, delegates sat in the convention hall in boiling weather and, without rest or refreshments, demanded to hear in continuous session the nominating and seconding speeches for eleven candidates, and go through four successive ballots. When the Convention adjourned, soon after seven o'clock, Chicago times, no one in it had eaten since breakfast, and the adjournment of the convention only marked the beginning of a series of all-night conferences, and manoeuvring, which chiefs of the various forces believe will bring accessions to their forces for the re-opening of balloting to-morrow morning.

SABLE I. HELD UP.
 SYDNEY, June 11.
 The first sensation of the Longshoremen's strike, which for three days has practically tied up the port of North Sydney, came to-day, when a large crowd of strikers made their way to the terminus of the Reid Nfld. Co. and forced the crew of the steamer Sable Island from loading part cargo of meat, consigned to merchants in St. John's, Nfld. Striking Longshoremen made their way to the wharf and tried, firstly, persuasion to induce the crew of the steamer to cease operations and leave the ship tied up. The crew refused, however, and continued to work. Seeing this the strikers, numbering over fifty, crowded about the freight car from which the meat was being unloaded, and loaded into the ship, and moved it along the track to a point where the ship's derricks could not reach. For some time they remained by the car, so as to prevent members of the ship's crew from moving it back to its original place alongside the Sable Island. When the crew of the steamer announced their intention of moving the freight car back to the steamer, the strikers threatened violence. Seeing this the officers of the ship summoned the police to the wharf. Order was restored and the crew was told that if they wished to continue loading the ship they would be protected from interference. The Sable I. sails for St. John's, Nfld., at noon to-morrow. As a result of the action of the strikers to-day, Capt. Murley of the Sable I. announced his intention of striking the port of North Sydney from the list of his ports of call. In future the Sable I.'s commander says that he will load his cargoes of freight at Halifax, and carry them from that port to St. John's.

JELICOE AND THE NAVY.
 LONDON, June 11.
 Admiral Viscount Jellicoe, speaking as the guest at a dinner given by the Colonial Institute to-day, said that as his report on his recent naval mission was still unpublished, he could say nothing about it, but in regard to impressions received, he found in the Dominions a great realization of the fact that sea power was all important to the British Empire, meaning not only a supreme navy, but also the ability to make full use of the sea by the mercantile marine, both in war and peace. The Dominions appreciated these facts and showed a growing anxiety at the gradually diminishing strength of the mercantile marine, relatively to some other countries. That anxiety was justified, and should be shared at home.

WILL ARREST TERRORISTS.
 LONDON, June 12.
 The cabinet discussed the Irish question yesterday, and received reports from Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland. According to the Daily Mail, the Chief Secretary advised the cabinet that measures taken are proving successful, and said he hoped shortly to arrest some of the principal terrorist leaders in Ireland.

ANOTHER GERMAN STRIKE.
 BERLIN, June 12.
 A sudden strike has broken out in the Frederick Alfred Smelting Works at Rheinhausen, near Duisberg. The plant, which was part of the Krupp Works, employs 8,500 persons. Demands for an immediate wage increase has been made by the malcontented, and when the management declared this to be impossible, the strike was called. Those who remained at their posts have been maltreated by the strikers. The loss to the works, thus far, is estimated at several million marks.

BUBONIC PLAGUE.
 MEXICO CITY, June 12.
 Two proved cases of Bubonic Plague have been discovered in the Republic of Salvador, the Mexican Secretary of Foreign Affairs is quoted as saying by El Democrata.

ANARCHISTS ARRESTED.
 LONDON, June 12.
 The general strike called in sympathy with the strike of a great number of workers in the Province of Bari, only, has been declared off, according to a Rome despatch to the Central News. Order has been restored, and troops withdrawn, the despatch says. Hundreds of anarchists have been arrested.

ALBANIAN TROUBLES.
 ATHENS, June 12.
 Despatches from Janina, Albania, indicate a troubled situation in that country. They report that an Italian General has been made prisoner by Albanians, and that Italian artillery has bombarded the village of Ouzati. Several clashes between Greek detachments and Bulgarian bands along the frontier are reported from Thrace.

QUEBEC IN SYMPATHY.
 MONTREAL, June 12.
 A strong stimulus to the American Federation of Labor to pass a resolution in favor of Irish Independence, was provided by Frank P. Walsh, of this city, who addressed a largely attended meeting in the Windsor Hall here last night on "Ireland of to-day." Mr. Walsh claimed that the passing of such a resolution would save more innocent lives in Ireland than the Red Cross Society had saved in any sector of the battlefields, and his suggestion was received with loud and prolonged applause, there being obviously many delegates present at the address. Alderman Dixon, representing Mayor Martyn, was present and said he had been authorized by the Mayor to say that the French-Canadian people were heartily in sympathy with the people of Ireland in their struggle.

MURLEE'S DILEMMA.
 LONDON, June 12.
 President Ebert has asked Chancellor Mueller to form a new cabinet, according to a Berlin despatch to the London Times. The Chancellor will try to secure the co-operation of Independent Socialists in the new Government, it is said, or otherwise will abandon the task.

HAMPERING SHIPMENTS.
 ROME, June 12.
 Railway strikes have been declared at Milan and Cremona, 48 miles southeast of Milan, as a protest against alleged despatches of munitions to Poland. Troops occupied

DARING AVIATOR.
 WARSAW, June 12.
 Another Bolshevik armored train, officered and manned by Germans with German machine guns, has been captured by the Poles near Kiev Bridgehead. Its capture is attributed by them to the performance of Capt. Edward J. Crosbie, of Brooklyn, N.Y., a member of the Kosciusko Aero Squadron, who, they say, flew beyond the train and cut the track by means of bombs. Polish Infantry later captured the crew.
