MAY SELL 45,000 SHARES OF C.P.R.
Canadian Government is Reported Planning to Sell Allen Stock by Private Sale.

A report is current in Montreal that the Canadian Government is preparing to dispose of the 45,000 shares of Canadian Pacific Railway stock that it holds for a special fund that is made up of the proceeds of property owned by enemy aliens. This stock has been held for several years already, and it seems that a decision has been reached that the present time is opportune for disposing of it. It is understood that there will be no effort to sell it on the open market where a transfer of even a few thousand shares might have the effect of depressing the stock for all shareholders, but that it will be offered by private sale. The delay in the disposal of this stock will have resulted in a considerably increased return for these shares owing to the rise that has taken place. The stock in 1920 showed limits between 134 and 109 1/2; in 1921 between 125 1/2 and 101; in 1922 the high was 151 1/2 and 119 1/2, while in 1923 the high was 156 and the low 140 1/2. The current price is running between 148 and 149.

DIVIDEND POLICY ON CANADIAN CAR.

Renewed buying of Canadian Car Company common has developed, due to the favorable reports that have been current regarding increased earnings which the company has been making. The company closes its fiscal year on September 30th, and it is expected that net profit will run well ahead of what they were in the previous year.

If this occurs the Car Company will be in a position to clean up all arrears of dividends on its preferred stock and also pay off the notes which were issued to liquidate a portion of preferred dividends. This would leave the way clear for a dividend on the common. Just what policy will be followed in connection with any distribution of the junior security will, it is expected, be determined by the outlook for the business this year, rather than on the strength of actual earnings.

In Car circles, it is felt, that prospects for 1925 are not as good as they were this time last year for the current year. This is due to the fact that the railways have acquired a large number of additional cars and therefore might not be in the market to anything like the same extent.

The Ghosts of the Tower

The cruelty of Tudor times, so harsh and relentless, brought to the Tower of London those pitiable figures whose ghosts fittingly might linger there, writes W. G. Bell in a London paper.

In the little cemetery plot before the altar of St. Peter and Vincula Church the royalties of them lie, fourteen in number, all save only Sir Thomas Overbury, who was murdered, harvested by the axe; and all save he and Monmouth, who rests below the altar itself, perished in the reigns of Henry Tudor, Edward Tudor, Mary Tudor, and Elizabeth Tudor.

Others there were, before and after; many, too, like Thomas Cromwell, More, and Bishop Fisher, found nameless graves in the church's nave; but this was the Tudor place of sepulchre prepared for the noblest of its victims.

There lie two of Henry's Queens who shared his throne, Anne Boleyn and Katherine Howard; the pathetic Lady Jane Gray, the Queen of a nine days' reign; the Protector Somerset, who ruled the realm; Dukes of Norfolk, Northumberland, and Suffolk; the Earl of Essex, Elizabeth's hand some favorite; the aged Margaret Pole, Countess of Salisbury—traitors all!

History has revised those hard judgments, and as the visitor to-day stands before the exalted dead a surging tide of human sympathy engulfs all other passions.
