The Maiden's Choice
 OR THE LAIRD OF BIRKENLEUCH
 A Tale of the Covenanters.

The immediate effect was unfavourable to Richard, for a motive was now indicated for the commission of the crime—that motive being revenge.

And though it was made to appear that the absconding from Brankswood took place months before the murder, yet any benefit to be derived from this was immediately nullified by the next proof which was led—the steady appearance of Richard in Greystone church on the day of the marriage, and Jamie Tansson's encounter with him on the heights at midnight.

And here was presented the most touching scene of all—the appearance of Helen in the witness box. Her beauty, her distress, her tender relation to the prisoner, which was well known, made her an object of the deepest pity and commiseration. No functionary of the law, however stern or hard-hearted, could put her through the dreadful ordeal she had to undergo with harsh or exacting minuteness. But the important fact was which she could bear witness must be elicited nevertheless, and she was asked with distinct exactness if she had seen Richard in church.

"Yes," was her mournful reply, uttered in a low whisper, but perfectly audible amid the breathless silence which prevailed.

It was enough. They required from her no further contribution to her lover's condemnation, and she was permitted to retire from the box, and take her seat near the bar by the side of Sir Gilbert Barton, there to wait with him for the momentous issue.

The Bellman followed next, and after him the Cadger. We know what their testimony amounted to—how seriously adverse it was, how it strengthened and tightened the chain of evidence against the hapless youth. When Jamie left the box, the firm impression on almost every mind was that Richard Wayland was guilty of the horrible crime laid to his charge.

Two witnesses only had been secured for the defence, and they had come forward voluntarily, though with much hesitation, for they ran serious risk to themselves in doing so; but inasmuch as they had something to tell, which seemed to neutralize the rest of the evidence, a sense of duty compelled them to appear and give that evidence which it was in their power to present.

They belonged to a class of people who did not allow danger to stand in the way of duty. They were two Covenanters, who resided in the immediate neighbourhood of Greystone, and on the evening in question they, along with a small band of persecuted Presbyterians, had met for worship at a solitary place among the wilds. The spot was far in the heart of the wilderness, and as their religious exercises were prolonged till the dawn, it was an hour or two after sunrise when they passed the cottage of Jabez Cringan on their way to their own homes.

At this hour Jabez Cringan was in the garden in front of his cottage, talking with a man in military garb, whose horse was fastened to a sapling near the garden gate.

The Covenanters were asked to say who this man in military garb was; and at the question Sir Gilbert Barton instinctively turned his gaze on Charlie Allan, from whose face the blood had vanished, leaving it livid and ghastly. But the blood returned, and the ghastly expression vanished, when the man replied that they were not near enough to identify the miser's military companion. The face and features of Jabez they saw and recognized well enough, but as it was dangerous for such as they to come into contact with a trooper, they turned from the path while yet a distance from the cottage, and went home another way.

This was undoubtedly important evidence in Richard's favour, but not conclusive of his innocence. It disposed of the theory that the Cadger met him he was speeding away from the scene of his crime fresh from the commission of the deed, for the man it was supposed he had there murdered was seen alive at least eight hours after. To this extent the whole previous evidence was affected. The Miser had not been murdered on that particular night; but might not the prisoner have lurked in the neighbourhood, and committed the crime on a subsequent occasion, though no one had chanced to see him in the locality after the Cadger met him?

When the Covenanters left the box, Richard's friends and Richard himself perceived that this was the opinion which prevailed in the Court. The testimony given had not exonerated him. In our day, the evidence as it stood would unquestionably have elicited a verdict not proven, but at the period of which we write aggregate testimony was not so nicely weighed and balanced, and more effort was given to impression than to pure evidence.

The prospect was therefore of the darkest character, and Richard felt the bitterness of death enter his soul, and his cold shadow gathered over his spirit. His innocence promised to avail him nothing. The cold steel eyes bent upon him contained everywhere the expression of a belief in his guilt. But as the conviction settled in his mind that this was the opinion of his judges, the proud consciousness which resided in his own bosom caused him to maintain before them a still calmer and loftier front. There was no quailing of his eye, no quiver on his lip; his brow was as clear, his countenance as composed, his mien as dignified as ever, and the truth within him protesting eloquently against the false conviction which threatened to be recorded.

No further evidence for the defence being forthcoming, the prosecutor was rising to address the Court, when a noise outside broke upon the stillness, and roused general attention and curiosity. There immediately followed a rustling sound in the ante-room, the door of the Court was thrown open, and a trooper staggered in, whose white livid face and rolling eyes were starting to behold.

The apparition struck every one dumb, and a thrilling sensation rushed through each heart, as in hoarse accents the soldier exclaimed—

"Richard Wayland is innocent. It was I who murdered Jabez Cringan!"

Charlie Allan leapt from his seat, and rushed to the trooper's side.

"Sloggan," he thundered. "What madness is this? Away with you to your lodging—You are not fit to be abroad. He is insane, my lord," he added with eager haste, addressing the judges. "He had an accident lately, and his wits are wandering."

"No use, Captain," shouted Sloggan. "I haven't long to live at any rate, and I dare not go to hell with more blood on my head. I am not mad as the Captain says," he cried looking round the Court, "I am as much in my senses as any one here, and I declare again that I hanged Jabez Cringan."
