CANADA ADDED TWO POINTS TO SCORE WHEN BRICKER TOOK SECOND IN RUNNING JUMP HIS CONQUEROR MAKING NEW MARK

Trouble Threatens Over Incident That Happened in the Four Hundred Metre Race; American Divinity Student Fouled German; Americans Still Lead in Total Points

STOCKHOLM, July 12.—Canada added two points to her score today when Bricker took second place in the running jump, in which Gutterson, of Vermont, made a new Olympic record of 24 feet 11 inches. Brock of Toronto, and Gallon, of British Columbia, put up game struggles in their respective heats of the 400 metres trials but they happened to get into fields that were too fast, though each finished third.

While the meeting so far has been characterized by the friendliest relations, there was an incident today that promised to rival the hard feeling that appeared in London in 1908, over the Carpenter incident. This time the German, Braun, was the cause of the disqualification of Donald B. Young, a divinity student from Amherst college, who runs under the colors of the Boston Athletic association.

German Was Fouled

In the last heat of the semi-finals of the 400 metres, Young and Davenport of Chicago, were running with Braun and Zurling, a Swedish runner. On the turn Young had the pole, the Swede was at his shoulder inside, while Braun was at his other shoulder. The German sprinted to pass Young then slowed and Young kept right on and put on his right arm, touching the German. The judges tried to stop Young at the second turn, but he kept right on while the Germans jeered him. Young came in two yards ahead of Braun but the German got the first place.

In explanation of his action the Amherst man, who feels his position very keenly, said:

"Braun was pushing me back. The only thing I could do, was what I did, or be pushed into the Swede. If they disqualify me they should certainly disqualify Braun."

Braun said he had undoubtedly been fouled but did not claim that the foul was intentional. He said that Davenport had rubbed into him on the last turn, and added that the smallest push may cost him two yards.

Americans Won't Protest

The American managers decided that while they considered the judges' decision wrong, they would not protest. After all these explanations from all concerned, came the announcement that Young had been disqualified, not for fouling Braun, but for interfering with Zurling, the Swede, whom he had tried to protect from Braun's apparent aggression. Mike Murphy, the veteran trainer, said Young's action was entirely justified as Braun tried to cross in front of him and Young could not be held liable for fouling other men, but Braun should have been disqualified for fouling whatever happened.

The total scores as announced: United States 100, Sweden 71, Great Britain 53, Germany 26, Finland 23, France 19, South Africa 11, Denmark 11, Norway 10, Italy 9, Canada 8, Hungary 8, Australia 9, Russia, Greece, Belgium and Austria 3 each, Holland 2.

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BASSANO MAY DROP OUT OF PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL TODAY; HURRY UP MEETING OF LEAGUE HAS BEEN CALLED

TODAY may be the last appearance of a Bassano baseball team in professional baseball. The Bassano players have all been paid up and unless some money is forthcoming within the next twenty-four hours, the team will either disband or be transferred to another town. For some time past those who have followed the team have been aware that there was trouble brewing but all had hoped that it would be patched up and the league would be able to finish the season as it started. But at the present time it looks as though all the efforts had failed and that the league would be forced to drop the Bassano team.

A hurry-up meeting of the executive of the league has been called for today and President Dewar will arrive from Edmonton on this morning's train to consult with the local men upon the plans for finishing the season.

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Several schemes have been thought of by those at the head of affairs but not until tonight will it be possible to make any definite announcement.

It is expected that overtures will be made with Lethbridge and Medicine Hat to take over the franchise of the Bassano club but whether either of these cities will see fit to take over the proposition it will be hard to state. Considerable rivalry exists between Medicine Hat and Bassano and it is quite possible that the Southern Alberta fans will be glad to take over the team, if for no other reason that it will show up the "Dam Site" city.

Whatever town does take over the team will be able to have professional baseball without much expense for the league arrangements have been paid and all of the expenses connected with getting a team together have been taken care of.

Whatever happens there will be professional baseball in Calgary and Edmonton for the management of each of these clubs is willing to continue and if nothing better can be arranged, home and home games will be played for the remainder of the season.
