A Great Methodist Gathering.

London, July 28.—The Methodist Church is now in annual conference at Bristol. The feature of this year's gathering so far has been the extraordinary display of interest in the church in America and the enthusiasm with which the American ministers have been welcomed by their British brethren. The Rev. Dr. Little, of Syracuse University, was quite taken aback by the warmth of his reception on Thursday, and the representatives of the Episcopal Church of America were deeply touched by the fraternal kindness extended to them. Unfortunately proceedings have not been uniformly edifying, and the visitors had to listen to heated debates growing out of serious charges against the Wesleyan missionaries in India, and out of the attempt to fix the stigma of heresy upon a brilliant young minister, who had published some pamphlets said to contain heterodox views.

Dismal Crop Reports.

London, July 28.—The weather the past week has been less uniformly miserable than it was last, but the alternations of heat and heavy rains have scarcely been improvements from the point of view of the crops. All the country market towns report gloomy despondency among the farmers, and general advances in the price of breadstuffs. In some places the rise was temporarily forced by the fact that English wheat was exhausted, and that continental dealers had intercepted foreign cargoes intended for England. Most dismal reports continue to come from France, where the damage seems even more general than here. The price of breadstuffs is going to be the worst food winter Europe has seen in a long time. The potato blight is working havoc throughout Cork and the whole west coast, and the parish priests all write that a famine must ensue.

Russia About to Make a Move.

London, July 28.—The signs seem to indicate that Russia is at last on the point of abandoning her passive attitude on the Eastern question. Nothing grave is thus far definitely threatened, but hints from a fingl quarter have been quietly circulated among Tory members of the Commons that it will be well for England, on the grounds of her foreign interests, to have Parliament in session in November. There is no alarm over the situation, but a merely general idea that Russia intends to make a decisive move during the next few months. Almost daily since March special telegraphic accounts of overtages committed by Moslems upon Christians in Armenia have been published. Of late these have been growing rapidly more blood-curding, until now we have a story of not less than 40 killed and 350 wounded in a massacre at Erzoum on Jane 20. The Vienna Presse prints an account giving 20 killed and 500 wounded. While it is quite possible that even the worst of these reports is true, the manner in which they are promulgated irresistibly recalls the way Russia worked the last time when she wanted is pretext to attack Turkey.
