that the London shops had been ordered closed and that a part of the work would be done here, he said that he had nothing whatever to say about the matter. It is currently understood among the Grand Trunk men here that the shops in London will be closed, and the work formerly done there will be turned out at Brantford and Toronto. The number of men employed at London was about 200, and a great deal of the work will without doubt be done at Brantford in the future.

IMPROVEMENT OF VICTORIA PARK.

The board of works met last evening with the following present: Chairman Ald. W. Heaman, Ald. John Heaman, Parnell, O'Meara, Nutkins, Callahan, Engineer Graydon and Street Commissioner Owens. A communication was received from the board of health asking for an office in the City Hall for the use of the health officer. He will be allowed the use of the relief office for one hour each day. Ald. Nutkins brought up a motion to give city control of sewer connections, but it was laid over. The caretaker of Victoria Park asked for various things for the improvement of the park. The band stand will be repaired until in a safe condition. Ten cords of sharp river gravel will be purchased for the repair of the driveway. The matter of the removal of old iron posts was laid over. The question of procuring hose for water was referred to the chairman and engineer. The report of the caretaker of Queen's Park was then taken up. He will be given fifteen cords of gravel and a small one-horse combination dump and watering cart at \$90. He will be given 500 feet 4x4 scantling for making new driveway, and \$10 to purchase flower seeds. He was also given ten pounds of grass seed. The engineer was asked to estimate the cost of certain changes in the roads at Victoria Park and report at the next meeting. The chairman, engineer, and Ald. Nutkins will investigate the matter of brick paving. Several small accounts were read and passed.
