STEAMER SUNK. London, Oct. 1.—The British steamer Wallachia, bound from Glasgow for Trinidad, struck on the rocks on Becon Perch, in the Clyde Sunday, bounded off and sunk. All on board were saved. The Wallachia was a wooden screw steamer of 1,724 tons, 259 feet long, 31 feet beam and 18 feet depth of hold. She was built at Southampton in 1883, and was owned by Taylor, Cameron & Co., of Liverpool.

COMING TO TERMS. London, Oct. 1.-The officials of the Foreign Office, answering questions on the subject, stated that a decree had already been published in the Pekin Official Gazette ordering the Viceroy of Sze Chuen to be stripped of his rank for failing to protect the missionaries in his district, and as a warning to others, it is further directed that he shall not again be permitted to take office. The decree also denounces the offending official's subordinates for failing to take proper action in the

emergency.

A Man Fast in a Sewer Drowned by the

Slowly Rising Water. Los Angeles, Oct. 1 .- A crowd of nearly a thousand people watched a man drown in this city and was powerless to help him. His name was Thomas Reynolds, and he was a laborer in a sewer building on Los Angeles street, near Boyd. The scene was the most

agonizing that can be imagined. At about 3 o'clock Reynolds was working in a new sewer that is building directly underneath an ald brick one. The ground is soft there, and Reynolds was caught by a small cave-in. His legs were pinioned by the falling earth, but none thought his situation serious. A rope was made fast to him and an attempt was made to pull him out, but his shovel had fallen

across his feet, and it was soon seen that he would have to be dug out. The work was at once begun. Sudnly, to the great horror of crowd that had assembled, the old man's head burst, and a large stream of water flowed into the excavation. gradually driving the rescuers out. A fire engine was sent for, and attempted

to pump the inflow of water out, but it proved of no avail. The man was doomed, and nothing could be done for him. He was upright in the hole, and the water soon reached his waist. For the first time he realized that he would die. Inch by inch the fluid rose, and the poor fellow lost his nerve, and commenced to utter the most heartrending shrieks and appeals for help. The streets became blocked with people, and as the news spread of demands of the powers interested in what was going on in that hole, the crowd became frantic with a desire to save the man. But absolutely nothing could be done to succor him. The water reached the throat, then the chin, then a ripple struck his lips.
