Short of Cash.

Impetuous Noblemen Who May Envy Marlborough.

Unexpected Discovery of Royal Remains in Angers Cathedral.

The Biggest Black Diamond That Has Yet Been Seen.

CABLE IN THE AMAZON.

London, Oct. 1.—Mr. Siemens has received a contract for laying a cable in the River Amazon, 1,200 miles into the interior of Brazil. Para will be the starting point and Mandos the terminus. The survey is now being made, and the work will begin in January.

COLONIAL CONFERENCE PROPOSED.

London, Oct. 1.—Premier Kingston, of South Australia, has invited the various interested colonies to send delegates to a conference to be held at Adelaide to consider relations of the colonies with Japan. He claims that there is an urgent necessity for such a conference in view of the influx into the colonies of Japanese from the north.

ENGLAND WANTS RAIN.

London, Oct. 1.—The prolonged heat and drought which have prevailed throughout England have inflicted a great deal of hardship and damage upon agriculturists. The pastures are completely destroyed by the dryness of the sun, and the scarcity of water for cattle threatens a milk famine. The crops of roots are also suffering.

PASTEUR'S REMAINS.

Paris, Oct. 1.—Pasteur's remains will be deposited in the Cemetery of Montmartre temporarily, and the final interment will take place on Oct. 23, the anniversary of the foundation of the French Republic. The directors, members and employees of the institute viewed the remains this morning, and which the general public was permitted to do the same. Floral wreaths and other such emblems of mourning are arriving from all parts and are being deposited about the bier.

A ROYAL "FIND."

London, Oct. 1.—Excavations in the Cathedral of Angers brought to light the other day the coffin of King Rene of Anjou, the father of Queen Margaret, so famous in the Wars of the Roses, and his wife. The remains of the latter have practically disappeared, being only in a tin case, but in the leaden coffin of King Rene was found preserved his skeleton entire. On his skull was a crown of thin gold leaf, in his right hand the scepter of Naples, and on his breast a jeweled orb all green with rust.

TURKS AND ARMENIANS IN CONFLICT.

Constantinople, Oct. 1.—A number of Armenians made a hostile demonstration against the authorities here today. The police attacked the mob, killing several persons and wounding others. Many persons were arrested. Order was finally restored. Another despatch says that after the trouble was over the Foreign Minister sent telegrams to the various embassies saying that the disturbances had been created by certain ill-disposed persons among the precincts of the Armenian patriarchate, but that, thanks to the measures taken, perfect quietude now reigned.

ADVANCE OF REFORM.

Buda-Pesth, Oct. 1.—The Lower House of the Hungarian Diet yesterday adopted a bill providing for the recognition of the Jewish religion and establishing freedom of worship.

The Reichstag has finally passed the remaining church reform bills, including the removal of all hitherto existing Jewish disabilities. The civil marriage law becomes effective today. The first bride under the new law will be the daughter of Deputy Mezel, and many civil marriages, both of Jews and Christians, have been announced throughout the Province. The churches have been busy during the last few days with weddings of devout Catholics under the old law.

A BIG BLACK DIAMOND.

Paris, Oct. 1.—The largest black diamond ever seen was shown to the Academy of Sciences by M. Moissan, a French chemist. It weighs 3.073 carats. This gigantic carbon was found by a digger in July last in the diamond field of Bahia. Its hardness is greater than that of a brilliant, and for this reason, it has great industrial value. It presents a surface partly smooth and partly corrugated, and is exactly similar to the particles of black diamond produced by M. Moissan in an electrical furnace. The three largest of the species previously found weighed 220, 810 and 1,700 carats, and the latter was not free from flaws. The present specimen is as big as a large pear, and apparently perfect.

THE ECHO ORGAN IN THE ABBEY.

London, Oct. 1.—The echo organ at Westminster Abbey, which Mr. Clark, of yachting fame, some time ago undertook to provide, has now been fixed in the triforium above the choir. The organ is a masterpiece of engineering, and is electrically connected with the main organ. A new keyboard has been added to the already complicated organ, making five manuals, and there are electrical contrivances in great variety, by means of which the couplings and stops are put into and out of action. The effect of touching the keys on the new manual is instantaneous, and the echo organ is as sensitive in responding as in the main instrument. The effect is found to be charming, but the instrument will not be brought into general use till Dr. Bridge, the organist, returns from his holiday, a week hence.

SURPRISED THE OLD KING.

London, Oct. 1.—King Khama, of Africa, has seen a good many wonderful things since his arrival in this country, but he has never allowed himself to express surprise until the other day, when, at Birmingham, he was taken around the autumn show of the local agricultural society. He is a great breeder of cattle himself, but the size and fatness of the show beasts simply astounded him, and set him thinking hard for the rest of the day. The old gentleman is by no means lacking in poetic imagination. The size of London and its swarming millions impressed him deeply. He was passing through Chesham at a crowded hour the other day, when he turned suddenly to one of his conductors and inquired: "Do you ever have locusts in this country?"

The locust scourge is the greatest calamity which ever visits his dominions, and the defendant told him that locusts were unknown in England. The old king shook his head sadly and remarked: "They could never trouble you as they do my country. It would only be necessary for your Queen to order each of her subjects to catch one locust and the plague would be at an end."
