Annual Meeting of the Western Fair Association.

The Exhibition of 1894 Was a Gratifying Success.

The Yearly Reports Presented by the President-A Healthy Balance On the Right Side.

The annual meeting of the Western Fair Association was held in the City Hall this afternoon commencing at 2:30. President Porte was in the chair. The attendance was good.

THE ANNUAL REPORT. President Porte presented his annual

report as follows: Your directors in presenting this the eighth annual report of the Western Fair Association have much pleasure in calling attention to the satisfactory results attending the 21st annual exhibition, while other large fairs have not been so fortunate.

Notwithstanding the proverbial "hard times," and the fact that we are not in the receipt of a municipal grant, as most of our competitors are, and that no special collections from the mercantile community have been received or asked for this year, the fair has held its own, which is more than might have been anticipated, and shows the strong sympathy of the public in our work.

The weather proved favorable during the principal days of the fair, and had it not been for the downpour on Saturday, and thedull appearance of the sky on Thursday morning of the second week, the gate receipts would have exceeded those of 1893, instead of showing the

very slight decrease of \$68 69. The displays in all departments were excellent. Those of the sheep, hogs and poultry were particularly noticeable, being largely in excess of any previous year. The live stock throughout could not be surpassed for excellence of condition and the variety of pure breeds

represented. The parade in the horse ring of the prize winning animals was the best arranged and most attractive exhibition of the kind ever witnessed at any Can-adian fair, and was very highly commended by our visitors, and spoken of as one of, if not the principal event of the show. The order in which they appeared being correctly classified, and at regular distances, reflects great credit on the exhibitors in charge of the stock, and afforded an excellent opportunity to those on the stands and around the ring of seeing this magnificent collec-

tion of pure-bred animals.

As will be seen by the financial statement, which has been audited as usual by Mr. G. F. Jewell, F.C.A., considerable money was expended on the grounds and buildings, for the purpose of attending to the comfort of our patrons and also to better supply the requirements of our exhibitors.

We found it necessary to improve the entrances and exits on Dundas street, and the city council having presented the association with a pair of iron gates, we had suitable posts erected, with cresting, etc., and the gates properly hung, also iron exit gates on either side, both of which were highly appreciated by the crowds who attended the fair. Several commodious closets were als built and located throughout

grounds at convenient points. The offi-

ces for the sale of tickets and the turnstiles were also moved back from the street and re-arranged, affording an opportunity to increase the width of the platform in front, for the better accommodation of the crowds of visitors. Important alterations were made in the Main Building's internal arrangements, so as to provide larger and more suitable spaces for the exhibitors, to enable them to put up more attractive displays. The changes, we are pleased to say, met with most satisfactory results, as the exhibits of many of the leading

Canadian firms proved to those who had availed themselves of the opportunity of viewing them.

Additional sheep and hog pens had to be built owing to the increased number of entries in these classes.

Four hundred and sixty-nine dollars of this outlay has been charged to the capital account, the balance going to general expenses. We heartily thank the members of the city council and the board of water commissioners for their cordial co-operation at all times, and the railways and express companies for their convenient arrangements and the courteous man-

companies discharged their respective duties. Our thanks are also due to the gentlemen who donated the special prizes as set forth in the list herewith. We would also gratefully remember the press of the city and Province, who so ably assisted us in bringing before the public the merits of the Western Fair from

vear to year. Your directors wish to place on record the highly satisfactory manner in which the officers of the association and their assistants performed their work. A. W. PORTE, President.
