TRADE IN CANADA.

Pointers from Dun & Co.'s Weekly
Statement.The Usual Summer Quietness With a
Somewhat Brighter Outlook
for the Future.

Toronto, June 27.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly statement of trade in Canada says Montreal advices indicate that the trade movement is assuming a quieter, seasonable shape, more particularly in heavy goods, such as metals, paints, oils, etc. Sugars, too, are dull, but there are indications that the large stocks laid in just prior to the rise are getting low, and refiners and jobbers expect more activity shortly. In general groceries there is a fairly steady distribution. Drygoods retailers in the city report satisfactory business for several weeks past, and July and August payments are being anticipated in some cases. Travelers also report count-ry drygoods stocks as moving off very fairly, and some of them report an inclination on the part of some of their customers to buy the bulk of their fall goods earlier this year than for several years past, due partly to the expectation of a better state of trade and partly to the belief that higher values prevail. Cheese has improved half a cent since last week, an advance which does not seem warranted by the state of the English market. Butter remains dull and weak. The crop prospects in Quebec Province are generally favorable. There is no particular activity in any department of trade at Toronto just now. The holiday season has begun. There is a large influx of citizens to summer resorts, and travel appears to be more general than usual. Prospects are considered satisfactory for a large volume of trade the coming autumn. The hay crop is poor west of Toronto, but the yield is likely to be large in the east. A good yield of coarse grains is expected in Ontario, but wheat will not be a large crop, and probably smaller than last year. Advices from Manitoba are cheering, and the largest crop of wheat ever harvested seems to be expected. There is a slight depression in prices of export cattle, owing to large supplies arriving in Great Britain. Wheat at Ontario points is a trifle firmer at \$3.30, but a majority of holders are asking 90c. The wool market is very firm, with a shipment of about 250,000 pounds of fleece in the United States. Better demand is noted for cheese, with sales at Ontario creameries at slightly higher prices.

The failures for the week were 22,
as against 35 for the same week of last year.

GUARDS HIS WIFE'S GRAVE.

A Promise Made Fifteen Years Ago
Faithfully Kept.

Cincinnati, June 27.—"If you die I will sleep by the side of your grave all the rest of my life." This remarkable vow was made fifteen years ago by Edwin L. Morrison, at that time chief clerk of the Pennsylvania freight department, and a protégé of Ralph Peters, the superintendent of the Miami division of the Pennsylvania road. For twelve days after his wife's death Morrison's grief was too great to allow him to fulfill his vow. He lived at Camp Denison, and when the stupor left him he built a little hut in the Miamiville, O., cemetery. To the sexton, who protested at first, Morrison said he was receiving \$35 a month to watch the grave. Time went by, and the man still sat in his hut, gazing at the grave. At last the keeper of the cemetery learned his story. Now, Edwin L. Morrison, once the handsome railroad man, is old, wrinkled and haggard, but still sits in his hut, gazing at the grave of the woman he loved so well. For fifteen years he has kept up this solemn vigil.

Morrison's history is full of tender pathos. An example of true devotion, he is familiarly known by every child in the village, and few persons visit the sequestered little town of Miamiville who fall to hear the story of his life. In rain or shine, summer or winter, he lingers around the little spot of green turf. He seldom talks long of his wife now. A small Bible is in his hand, and it is the names and dates of the birth of several boys and girls of his name, but most prominent upon this page of record are the words: "Mary L. Morrison, died April 24, 1880," written in a trembling hand.

Day after day for years he has spent in the gloom of this old graveyard. No strife of outer world has calmed him, no peaceful existence. His friends have attempted to prevail upon him to return to Cincinnati, but he refuses.

THE IRON AND STEEL BOOM.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 27.—The Iron
Trade Review says today: "The ad-
vance in iron and steel is not a
momentum every week, and while there
is no concealment of the fear that
things may be moving too rapidly for
the health of the trade, everybody
seems to be struggling to hold the
market down. With their product
engaged for 60 days to six months
ahead, and inquiries and orders steady-
ly growing, the mills and steel works
are swinging along toward a condi-
tion that now lacks only a few ele-
ments of a boom."

HE KNEW HIM.

Not long ago an officer of the London School Board was crossing Covent Garden market at a late hour, when he found a little fellow making his bed for the night in a fruit basket. "Would you not like to go to school and be well cared for?" asked the officer. "No," replied the urchin. "But do you know that I am one of the people who are authorized to take up little boys whom I find as I find you and take them to school?" "I know you are, old chap, if you find them in the streets; but this here is not a street. It is private property; and if you interfere with my liberty the Duke of Bedford will be down upon you. On the Heights.

Bugle Blasts From the White City on
the Hill.Repairing the Butts—Veterans in Camp—
The Day's Routine.

THURSDAY.

For the first time the citizens saw the battalions "down town" this afternoon. The Thirty-second, Twenty-seventh, Twenty-second and Twenty-ninth marching from the heights to Adelaide street, and thence through a portion of Queen's avenue, the beautiful foliage of which the men appreciated. It was walking under a canopy of leaves which afforded grateful shelter. There is no such thing as a tree on Carling's Heights. The men returned by dusty roads, which proved very disagreeable.

The Twenty-first, Essex, had some good practice at the range, but it was interrupted by an untimely accident. A spent bullet pierced the boards which protect the markers, and struck Mark Richard Campbell on the head near the top. Had it hit him a little lower the result might have been fatal. His wounds were dressed, and though very painful he pluckily refused to retire to the hospital.

The butts were then pronounced unfit for use, and the battalion returned to the barracks. They will go to the ranges again to-morrow. In the meantime the butts have been repaired, many think the targets are too low for the safety of the marksmen. The following are the orders for to-morrow (Friday):

London, June 27, 1895.
Officer of the day to-morrow, Major Weir, 22nd. Next for duty, Major Cooper, 25th.

Medical officer for the ranges to-morrow, Surgeon McWilliams, 22nd. Next for duty, Surgeon Gilson, 27th. The 28th Battalion will furnish the duty band to-morrow. Next for duty, the 22nd.

Signed, B. H. Vidal, Major and brevet Lt.-Col. A. A. G. for camp. The P. A. and C. Smith, gave a very instructive lecture on "Regimental Organization" in the sergeants' mess-room at 8 p. m., which was largely attended by officers of the 21st.

Mr. C. H. Egan, sergeant of the 21st, is a clever member of the "Journal" staff. He resides in Windsor. "The men of the 21st," said a member of No. 1 company, "are the most gentlemanly set we have ever had in the barracks."

An immense crowd visited the heights to-day. A number of privates were stopped on the streets to-night by special constables and reprimanded for smoking, which is only allowed on the grounds. There were about 15 prostrations from the heat today, but no serious cases are reported.

FRIDAY.

A detachment from No. 1 Company, R. C. I., went to the ranges this morning to repair the butts, owing to an accident on Thursday. The Essex Battalion were ordered to continue their rifle practice this afternoon. Lieut. Col. Lindsay, of the Seventh Battalion, is the musketry instructor. They will go to the ranges to-morrow (Saturday). It is easier work than drilling.

It was not on the heights this morning, and a few of the men collapsed, but before noon the air cooled and the subsequent shower was welcomed. It was the first heavy rain, and though the canvas proved a sufficient shelter overhead it was necessary to make trenches around some of the tents to prevent the water from pouring in between them.

The First Hussars can boast of more veterans than any of the other battalions. Perhaps the most distinguished is Troop Sergeant-Major Kavanagh, of "D" Company, Kingsville. He was a trooper in the old Seventh "Death or Glory" Lancers, who achieved distinction in the Zulu war. Kavanagh was in the charge of the guard that found the body of the Prince Imperial of France. At the review in Aldershot, Eng., last year, he took the first prize in the review. The veteran is very modest and long, but he is not without his exploits.

Farrier Sergeant Bob Courtney, of the First Hussars, London, is a veteran of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and also served in Zululand. He had charge of the pharmacy department in the Egyptian campaign, and was in the battle of Tel-el-Kebir.

Orderly Room Sergeant Jacobs (London) of the First Hussars, was in the Indian mutiny, and a member of the old Sixtieth Regiment. He has had a long military experience.

An officer is authorized for the statement that several members of the Twenty-first (Essex) band are American soldiers who have obtained leave of absence from Fort Wayne and other points, and take the opportunity of spending the holidays. However this may be, the band is certainly an excellent one.

Dominion Day (Monday) from present indications is going to be very quiet. The Twenty-first have obtained official permission to visit Chatham on that day.

The popular commandant of the Twenty-seventh (Queens) has offered a handsome silver cup for rifle competition among the members of the battalion. It will be shot for on Saturday. Bugler Demaris, of Toronto, is getting the First Hussars' trumpeters into line.

A good story is told at the expense of a police sergeant of the R. C. I. He saw a fire burning in the line of the First Hussars after hours Wednesday night, and gruffly ordered Paymaster Hobbs and other officials to put it out. They referred him to the D. A. G., Col. Smith. He complained to the commandant, but returned shortly and announced that he would permit the fire to burn. It appears that the D. A. G. ordered the fire, the night being damp.

Until the afternoon parade is over no non-com or private is allowed to leave the camp without a pass from the commanding officer.

It is said that some of the cavalrymen carry needles in order to prick the blisters on their feet.

The splendid Berlin band will leave for home on Saturday night, and will return on Monday night or Tuesday morning. They will play at the C. W. A. meet at Waterloo on Monday.

"Colonel" Mooney is reading the officers of the First Hussars mess in capital style.

Sergeant Widgeaway, of the Royal Dragoons, Toronto, who is instructing the cavalry, is a soldierly-looking fellow, and is doing good work.

There are only seven men in the hospital and none of the cases are serious. The men are making splendid progress," said Colonel Gartshore, of the Hussars. "They find the first two or three days hard work, but now they begin to like it."

So far the man who has been unable to devour his daily food allowance has not been found.

About twenty couples of the Twenty-ninth (Waterloo) enjoyed a stag dance on the heights last night.

GOOD OLD MIDDLESEX.

Mrs. McIntosh, of con. 19, East Williams, while driving on Glasgow street, Alisa Craig, with her son, was thrown from the buggy, and sustained severe injuries, one arm being broken.

The North Middlesex license commissioners have reconsidered their action in refusing to grant a full year's license to the Central Hotel and Power House.

Rev. T. E. Harrison remains in Melbourne for another year. This is the first time a Methodist minister has remained more than three years in Melbourne.

The funeral of the late Norman Fish, sen., of London township, took place Wednesday. A large number of people from all over the township were present to pay their last mark of respect to one of the pioneers of the country, one who, although he took no active part in public life, was widely known and thoroughly respected for his sterling, upright traits of character. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. W. McGuffin, John Kennedy, John Molt, T. H. Talbot, John Hasket and E. Cor-sant.

The Arva Methodist Sunday school held their annual picnic in the grove of Mr. T. Pruleigh, where the scholars, with their parents and a large number of friends gathered. A number of games and races took place, followed by an excellent programme of readings, recitations and songs. Ice cream and other refreshments were served in a style which redounded to the credit of the ladies.
