Joint Meeting of Free and United

Presbyterian Churches.

The Formal Union Now Consummated-Grain Crop Fail-

ure in Russia. ALL ONE BODY. Edinburgh, Oct. 31.—The formal union of the Free and United Presbyterian Churches, decided upon yes day at the joint meeting here of th Free Church Assembly and the United Presbyterian Synod was consummat ed this morning. The ministers march ed from their respective halls to th Royal Institution, then proceeded to Waverley Market and held the first meeting of the United Free Church of Scotland. Large crowds witnessed the procession. Rev. Robert Rainy, D.D. was chosen moderator of the United Free Church.
