Gen. Buller Is Advancing

His Troops Operating in Boer Territory.

Enemy Abandon Laing's Nek—Rundle and Brabant Have Difficult Work Out Out for Them—British Prisoners Held as Hostages—21 Miles of Railway North of Kroonstad Torn Up—Death of Another Canadian—Red Cross Work.

London, June 10.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Sir Redvers Buller:

"Headquarters in Natal, June 10.—With reference to my telegram of June 8: We halted yesterday to get our trains up the pass, which is very steep. I find the enemy were about 2,000 strong in a very carefully prepared position which they must have been very disheartened not to have held longer than they did. They have all retired about 26 miles to the northwest.

"I find our casualties were more than I first thought. They were: One officer wounded and two men killed and thirteen wounded."

IN BOER TERRITORY.
London, Monday, June 11, 3:30 a.m.—Gen. Buller is in Boer territory. Dispatches of correspondents with him filed yesterday at sunset, describe the corps as camping at Gansel, close to the point where the frontiers of the Free State, the Transvaal and Natal meet.

"The British marched eight miles yesterday," says a Reuter correspondent, "before encountering any opposition. The Boers, who had one gun, withdrew under heavy ordnance fire to a ridge just ahead of the camp. This long-range, running skirmish will doubtless be renewed this morning. The Boers are expected to make rapid progress now, and to throw the weight of 20,000 men into Lord Roberts' Transvaal combinations."

"The fighting on June 6, in which the Boers were killed 20 casualties, was kept up all day long by musketry and artillery. The British attacking line, three miles in length, made its way amid the precipitous hills. A Boer gun on Spruit Kop fired shrapnel rapidly at the British right flank, but every shell was buried in the ground before bursting. The defensive power of modern weapons seems less effective in rough country than upon level ground where wide spaces can be covered with flat trajectories."

A DOUBTFUL DISPATCH.
A belated dispatch from Mount Prospect, via Newcastle, Natal, dated Thursday, June 7, throws light on the armistice agreed upon between the British and Boers recently. It appears that Gen. Buller met Gen. Christian Botha on June 2 at O'Neill's farm, between Umgela and Majuba, and summoned Botha to surrender. Gen. Botha said he was not empowered to do so, but the demand was made. Gen. Buller replied, "Very well," and turned to go away, when Gen. Botha pressed him to make a proposal.

Gen. Buller said he had no proposal to make, but pointed out that the Boers were surrounded, and referred to the uselessness of shedding unnecessary blood.

"I want you to do," asked Gen. Botha beseechingly, "Return to your farms, leave your big guns, and await Lord Roberts' decision," replied Gen. Buller.

The federal commander said he would refer the question to the burghers.

Gen. Buller then acceded to Gen. Botha's appeal for an armistice until daybreak. He was 6 showing that the Boer reports of Gen. Buller having requested an armistice to have been incorrect.

The dispatch adds that the federals are understood to have twenty-three guns in position, but it is doubtful if they can remove them. Their only line of retreat is in the direction of Lydenburg.

Gen. Buller has replied in rather curt terms to Gen. Botha's proposal that if they wish to surrender it must be unconditional, and an artillery duel is proceeding at Ingogo.

[Note.—Gen Buller's dispatch makes no mention of the incident detailed above.]

RUNDLE AND ERABANT.
Gen. Rundle's and Gen. Brabant's divisions are still at Hammonton, in the Ficksburg district. The latest intelligence from their headquarters is that the Boers are determined to fight to the bitter end. They are concentrating 4,000 men around Bethlehem. The country between them and Gen. Rundle is mountainous, and resembles Northern Natal in being exceedingly difficult for military operations. Gen. Rundle's present care is to prevent the Boers getting past him southward.

Major Wood, of Rundle's staff rode to a Boer outpost on June 6 and announced that Pretoria had been occupied by the
