# Is Advancing

His Troops Operating in Boer Territory.

Enemy Abandon Laing's Nek-Rundle and Brabant Have Difficult Work Out Out for Them—British Prisoners Held as Hostages-21 Miles of Railway North of Kroonstad Torn Up-Death of Another Canadian-Red Cross Work.

eceived the following dispatch from Sir Redvers Buller:

"Headquarters in Natal, June 10 .-With reference to my telegram of June We halted yesterday to get our trains up the pass, which is very steep. I find the enemy were about 2,000 strong in a very carefully prepared position which they must have been very disheartened not to have held longer than they did. They have all retired about 26 miles to the northwest.

"I find our casualties were more than I first thought. They were: One officer wounded and two men killed and thirteen wounded."

#### IN BOER TERRITORY.

London, Monday, June 11, 3:30 a.m.-Gen. Buller is in Boer territory. Dispatches of correspondents with him filed yesterday at sunset, describe the corps as camping at Gansolei, close to the point where the frontiers of the Free State, the Transvaal and Natal

A DOUBTFUL DISPATCH. A belated dispatch from Mount Prospect, via Newcastle, Natal, dated Thursday, June 7, throws light on the armistice agreed upon between the British and Boers recently. It eppears that Gen. Buller met Gen. Christian Botha on June 2 at O'Neil's farm, between Umgueta and Majuba, and summoned Botha to surrender, Gen. Botha said he was not empowered to accede to the demand. Gen. Buller replied, "Very well,"

and turned to go away, when Gen. Botha pressed him to make a pro-Gen. Buller said he had no proposal to make, but pointed out the Boers were surrounded, and re-ferred to the uselessness of shedding

unnecessary blood. What do you want us to do " asked Gen. Botha beseechingly.
"Return to your farms, leave your big guns, and await Lord Roberts' decision," replied Gen. Buller. The federal commander said

RUNDLE AND BRABANT. Gen. Rundle's and Gen. Brabant's divisions are still at Hammonia, in the Ficksburg district. The latest intel-ligence from their headquarters is that the Boers are determined to fight to the bitter end. They are concentrating 4,000 men around Bethlehem. The country between them and Gen. Rundle is mountainous, and resembles Northern Natal in being exceedingly difficult for military operations. Gen. Rundle's present care is to prevent the Boers getting past him southward. Major Wood, of Rundle's staff rode to a Boer outpost on June 6 and an-nounced that Pretoria had been occupied by the British. How the Boers received this news is not recorded. Although 600 Boers have surrendered to Gen. Rundle.

The last information received here shows that President Steyn is at Bethlehem. He has a small band of desperate men with him, and the great body of the burghers in the northeast of the Orange River Colony appear to be heartily sick of the war.

AT VENTERSDORP. Gen. Hunter's advance has occupied

London, June 10 .- The war office has I Ventersdorp, one hundred miles southwest of Pretoria. This took place on June 7. Gen. Plumer's column is on the Elands River, northwest of Pre-Gen. Mahon's column has rejoined Hunter. The British are sending detachments right and left to accept the surrender of commandos, horses, cattle and forage, and to overawe the sparsely settled country. Thus far only one small commando has been heard of, a commando at Tail Basch. Gen. Hunter's immediate objective is Potchofostroom. This town and rustenburg are the largest towns west of Johannesburg. It is reported Potchofstroom is ready to submit. Gen. Hunter has warned all burghers that if the telegraph is cut behind him, he

Toronto, June 11.-In a letter from Red Cross Commissioner Ryerson, at Bloemfontein, under date May 4, the doctor says there were then 1,100 enteric fever cases in the hospital there, and 2,500 of all sorts. He adds: "It may be of interest to you to know that Lady Roberts, Lady Airlie and the Missses Roberts are moking bandages with the beautiful little machine given by the nurses of the general hospital, Toronto. Warm coverlets, towels, shirts, etc., are also most welcome. The coverlets were picked up at once, they were so light and warm. I am reserving some of them for the Canadian sick, of whom we have nearly 100 at present. We have a large depot here, with quantities of food, handkerchiefs, wine, brandy, whisky, shirts, pyjamas, mineral waters, books, magazines, etc. British contributions come the Canadian, and then the International Red Cross Society. I am supplying the hospitals here with 600 eggs daily from

Cape Town, at a daily expense eight pounds ten shillings." NO CAUSE TO COMPLAIN.
