### \*\*\***\*\*\*** LARGE SHIPMENT OF HOLIDAY PCULTRY

Ten Carloads of Turkeys Will Be Sent to England From This City.

On Tuesday next a shipment of ten carloads of turkeys, the largest ever sent out of this city, will leave the London Cold Storage Company's establishment for England, there to be disposed of for the Christmas trade. The shipment will comprise 30,000 turkeys, while 6,000 chickens will also be sent at the same time. The shipment is being made by Mr. A. J. King, the first Canadian to ship plucked birds to the markets of the old country. Mr. King and his staff have been engaged in the work connected with the present shipment for over a month, and have gathered the birds from all parts of the country. Yesterday three car-loads of birds came down from Lucknow, and were unloaded at the cold storage siding. Many of the turkeys, probably one-half, will go to England with their plumage on, Mr. King having found that in parts of the old land there is sale only for unplucked birds. Plucked or unplucked, the turkeys are packed into cases, averaging fifteen to a case. They are assorted according to weight, and hens and cocks are put up separately. The plucked birds have all their feathers removed save on the hip bones, and are each wrapped in parchment paper. At the cold storage the birds are kept in a room some 20° below freezing. The price paid for these 30,000 birds was 6½ cents, live weight, and 71/2 cents dressed, delivered. Mr. King says farmers should begin feeding in September. He believes that the export trade in poultry will increase enormously in the next few years. London is the center of an ideal poultry-raising section, and has every facility for the work.

### Chicago Marine Band.

The Auditorium was crowded to the entrance last night at the concert given by the famous Chicago Marine Band, under the conductorship of T. P. Brocke, who has done so much to bring the band to its present state of excellence. The afternoon concert was also well attended. The programmes at both concert were made up mainly of essentially light and popular selections. At the evening concert the first movement from Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony" was rendered with a skill and sweetness that made it easily the choicest number on the programme, while the mozaic from "Carmen," and Mr. Simon's trombone solo of his own composition, "La Capniccio," were also highly enjoyable.


