Sudden Death of a Child on a Ferry Steamer.

TOY PISTOLS CAUSE LOCKJAW

Drowning Accidents at Frome and Sarnia-Ekfrid Man Killed by Lightning.

Windsor, Ont., July 15 .- John, the 14months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Ritchie, of 37 Fourth avenue, Walkerville, died on Sunday afternoon at the Joseph Campau dock, Detroit. In the morning Mrs. Ritchie gave the child some peanuts, and a husk stuck in his windpipe, causing him to cough violently. After a vain endeavor to stop the coughing. Dr. Hoare was summoned and advised that the boy be immediately taken to Harper Hospital, Detroit. The doctors examined him with an X-ray, but were unable to locate the husk. The family returned home and the child seemed quite well again. He ate a hearty dinner, and was playing with some companions when another fit seized him. Dr. Hoare was again summoned, and again sent the child to the hospital. When the Campau dock was reached his condition was so serious that an ambulance was summoned. The surgeon administered an emetic, but the child strangled in its mother's arms. Just before he died the boy emitted the husk that caused his death. The heartbroken parents took the little body to their home in Walkerville.

DEADLY TOY PISTOLS. Bay City, Mich., July 15 .- Walter Harris died yesterday from lockjaw, the third victim in 72 hours, in each of which the affliction was traced to injuries on the hands by toy pistols on the Fourth. He was 17 years old.

DR. MURRAY INJURED.



According to the statement of Robert Pinchin, of Windsor, who is the business manager of the Consumers' Tobacco Company, Leamington, the trust has been working against his interests with the wholesale men, and he has lost a great amount of business through the methods employed by the trust to divert all the business to its

The system followed by the trust, according to Pinchin, is to announce that it has the sole right to sell a certain brand of cigarettes and American tobacco in Canada, and the wholesale dealers cannot have their orders for these brands filled if the wholesale dealers cannot have their orders for these brands filled if they sell the tobacco they sell the tobacco manufactured by outside firms. In many cases the threat has had the desired effect, entailing a loss to the firms outside the trust, and the Canadian Government was finally asked to stop the practice.
