IT WAS HIS OWN FATHER

Engineer Realized He Was Bound to Kill Him.

Brockville Man Injured at a Crossing—Minister Killed.

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 6.—While a giant engine attached to a long train of coaches was thundering over the rails of the New York Central, Engineer Ford, peering out of the steaming cab-window, saw the form of an old man standing on the tracks, a strip of flag fluttering in his hand. Then, with a hopeless cry, the man in the cab gave a quick jerk at the steam valve and felt backward in the cab as he saw the body of the old man, his own father, struck by the iron horse and hurled ahead a distance of 60 feet.

The aged man, Robert Ford, had just stepped on the tracks after flagging a fast freight, with his back turned toward the engine when struck. He heard the blast of the whistle, accompanied by the sharp cry of the bell, made an effort to jump aside, but he was too late. When the train came to a standstill the lifeless form of the old man was picked up from the ground. The son is almost frantic with grief.

KILLED AT A CROSSING.

Winnetka, Conn., Jan. 6.—Rev. A. H. Norris, pastor of the Congregational church in Torrington, while driving to Torrington to preach to his congregation in that town, was struck and instantly killed by a special train on the Narragansett division of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad. Mr. Norris was 57 years of age.

Brockville, Ont., Jan. 6.—While driving over the railway crossing near McLaren's mills, on Perth street, John Shaver was struck by a C. P. R. passenger train and seriously injured, but will probably recover. The cutter was demolished. Mr. Shaver was electrocuted on his own behalf, being a candidate for the town council.

STRUCK BY TROLLEY CAR.

Lancaster, Pa., Jan. 6.—Jacob Zook, an Amish farmer, residing near here, was driving to church with his two daughters, Fanny, aged 18, and Katie, aged 15, when a trolley car struck and inflicting serious injuries on Mr. Zook and the younger daughter.

G. T. R. YARDMAN INJURED.

Toronto, Jan. 6.—Edward Williams, a Grand Trunk Railway yardman, was crushed between two cars near the foot of Dufferin street and badly injured internally.

INJURED IN THE TUNNEL.

New York, Jan. 6.—Antonio Jeppo was killed by a fall of timber in the Rapid Transit tunnel at One Hundred and Sixteenth street yesterday.

SEATTLE FLOOD DROWNED.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 6.—The flood situation in the district south of Seattle does not seem to be greatly improved. Two men engaged in rescuing people at O'Brien, have been drowned by the capsizing of their skiff. This city is in darkness owing to the flooding of the electric lighting plant.

GLoucester, Mass., Jan. 6.—Two men were swept overboard and drowned, while others narrowly escaped the same fate on Christmas Day, when the schooner Aloha, which has just reached here from Newfoundland, encountered a terrific gale.
DRANK POISONED WHISKY.

Colorado Springs, Col., Jan. 6.—J. F. Bailey, who drank poisoned whisky given him as a present died today. His wife, who drank from the same bottle, has partially recovered. The asserts that the whisky was purposely poisoned and given her husband. There is no clue to the murderer.

SHOT HIMSELF.

Syracuse, N. Y., Jan. 6.—After a lovers' quarrel, in the presence of his sweetheart, Blue Darling, 21 years of age, shot himself in the temple, at Gouverneur, and died five minutes later.

WILL INCREASE THE COST OF COAL

Agreement With Independent Operators Suspended.

ACTION OF ANTHRACITE ROADS

An Alleged Combine—The Coal Question Brought Up in the United States Senate.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 6.—Mayor Maybury has approved an appropriation of \$50,000 for the purchase of coal to be sold at cost by the municipality. Bids will be invited on anthracite and bituminous coal in lots up to 10,000 tons, to be sold as indicated.

ALLEGED COMBINE.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 6.—The grand jury was summoned before Judge Nott in common pleas court and instructed to investigate the charge that a combine exists among local coal dealers. The cost of soft coal has been steadily advanced of late, until it is now selling for double the price asked six months ago.

WILL INCREASE COST.

New York, Jan. 6.—Reports from Philadelphia stating that the anthracite roads had suspended the 65 cent per ton agreement with the independent operators, were confirmed today at the offices of several of the roads interested. In the case of the Lehigh Valley, the suspension carries until March 21. The strongest pressure was brought to bear against the roads because of the large number of independent operators along its lines. The Lackawanna road is a party to the suspension agreement, but not for any fixed period, and may cancel its agreement with the independents at will.

It is the opinion of coal road representatives that the action of the independents must inevitably increase the cost of coal to the public. Altogether there are over 100 independent or individual operators in the Lehigh, Schuylkill and Wyoming coal districts. Their output for 1902 was, of course, greatly reduced by reason of the protracted strike. In 1901 the aggregate tonnage of the independents in the districts named was about 15,000,000 tons.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 6.—When the Senate reconvened yesterday, a discussion began regarding the coal situation. Mr. Lodge prefaced his introduction of a bill suspending for 90 days the duty on coal, with the statement that in New England there was much distress owing to the scarcity of coal, and that the coal situation was a matter of public importance.

Mr. Cullerton followed with a resolution providing for the removal of the duty on anthracite coal, and asked its immediate consideration.

Mr. Platt (Connecticut) objected, saying it was his understanding there was no duty on anthracite coal.

Mr. Vest took exception to this statement, and said that the board of general appraisers and President Roosevelt had decided that such a duty is imposed. Mr. Vest also introduced a resolution on the subject.

IN CASE OF STRIKE.

Washington, Jan. 6.—Senator Mason, of Illinois, introduced a bill to provide for the temporary operation of coal mines in case of a strike.

He provided that hereafter, whenever any coal mine is unoperated and continues to be unoperated to the prejudice of the rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Attorney-General to apply to any judge of a United States court for a receiver for the mine, who, if appointed, shall serve until such time as the coal mine is operated, or until the mine is sold, which continued until 2 o'clock, when the resolution went over.

Mr. Nelson (Minnesota) addressed the Senate in opposition to the "omnibus bill," and favored single statehood for Oklahoma and Indian Territory. Mr. Nelson had not concluded his remarks when the Senate adjourned.
