CLERGY PREFER SUNDAY BASEBALL

New York Ministers Say It Is Better Than Coney Island or Other Resorts.

Sunday baseball in Brooklyn is likely to become a burning question. Rev. Dr. Henry C. Swentzel, rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Clifton, advanced ground on the question and declares that he would rather see the game of ball on Sunday than know that they were at Coney Island or some other wide-open resort. He says: "Baseball is a clean, healthy, outdoor sport, and considered by itself is one of the best and most desirable forms of recreation and entertainment. I would not regret the youth who is cooped up every day of the secular week of this harmless recreation when conducted with proper regard to the comfort and convenience of churchgoers. Personally I would prefer an old-fashioned Sunday, but if the young men must have recreation, then there is nothing better or more innocent than a game of ball."

Rev. Father Donohue, of the Roman Catholic Church, of St. Thomas Aquinas, and Rev. Father F. F. McGoldrick, of St. Michael's, at Forty-second street and Fourth avenue, declared for Sunday baseball as much more to be desired than Coney Island and kindred resorts for Sunday recreation. Father McGoldrick encouraged the game and to facilitate matters personally secured from the warehouse people the use of the building grounds. It is said he is even a director in one of the teams made up of his parishioners.

Rev. Dr. John L. Belford, of the Church of St. Peter and Paul, Wythe avenue and South Second street, also declared himself as favoring baseball on Sunday or any other day as a healthy and harmless recreation.

NOW RECOGNIZED BY HENLEY STEWARDS

For the first time in the history of rowing the Canadian Association of Amateur Rowmen was this spring admitted into affiliation with the English association and with the Henley stewards. Formerly the entire rowing had to be done by the Henley and the Henley stewards reserved to themselves the right and duty of inquiring into the eligibility of the entries. With the change inaugurated under the affiliation, the stewards hold the Canadian association accountable for the entries sent.

The Henley rule is very much stricter than the American one, and bars anyone from entering at Henley who has ever at any time been employed for manual labor for money or wages; or has been by trade an elevator operator, engaged in any menial duty. The Canadian association must therefore understand that Lou Scholes comes under that amateur rule, or refuse to vouch for him as an amateur to the Henley stewards, in which event his entry would be refused at Henley.

FAMOUS SPORTING MAN DIED VERY SUDDENLY

New York, April 26.—James C. Kennedy, a well-known sporting man and former writer on sporting subjects, died suddenly of a heart attack while on the train as it was drawing up at Brooklyn station.
