MUNYON'S WOMEN'S WORK RHEUMATISM CURE IN GOOD CAUSE

Good Record of Y.M.C.A. Auxiliary for the Past Year.
Interesting Reports Submitted at Annual Meeting—The Election of Officers.

The annual meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of the Y. M. C. A., was held yesterday at the association building, with a good attendance of members present. Gratifying reports were presented, the consideration of which constituted the main business of the afternoon.

The report of the secretary, Mrs. A. J. Wood, reviewed in condensed form the work of the year. The society has at last obtained its long-desired object, that of wiping out the debt for furnishings to the Y. M. C. A. building, the cost of which they undertook to defray. Not a cent now remains to be paid. The sum required was a large one, and the efforts of the members of the auxiliary must have been untiring and determined to meet it in so short a time. Because this has been done, however, the work will not be stopped.

The secretary's report showed that ten regular and two special meetings had been held during the year, with an average attendance of 13 members. The devotional exercises during the year were of a helpful character, many second and third class talks were given. In May the society had the pleasure of making the last payment on their share of the debt fund.

All the women who took part in the different committees during the year were very successfully performed. The rooms committee added several new pieces of furniture to the rooms, besides keeping all the furnishings in order.

The president, Miss Ware, was unable to do active work at the beginning of the year, and that was the only time when any feeling of despair was felt. She has since been able to attend to her duties and the work has gone on very smoothly.

One hundred and thirty-eight members were on the roll, a decrease of 31 from last year.

The treasurer, Mrs. Gregstin, in her report, thanked the many kind persons who have contributed during the year, and showed that the auxiliary was flourishing financially.

Other reports were presented and accepted without discussion.

During the evening Mr. F. W. Anderson, who leaves shortly as a traveling association secretary to India, gave an interesting little talk, and spoke of the work he was about to take up. His sister, Miss Emma Anderson, of Chicago, was also a visitor at the meeting.

Tulley; press committee, Miss Fleming; boys' work committee, Mrs. C. R. Sayer.

EGGS FROM AUSTRALIA.
Some interesting official experiments and tests with eggs from New Zealand treated by the Ellis system were carried out at the offices of the agent-general for the colony in Victoria street. Eggs shipped among ordinary cargo, not in refrigerating rooms, proved to be fresh and good in taste and smell, although four months old. The Ellis system is not one of preserving in lime or of coating with preservatives, and, as Mr. Ellis has preserved eggs for twenty months, a revolution in the egg trade may possibly ensue as a result of his discovery.
