

Little surprise expressed here when news came from St. Louis that Mr. Hearst had canceled his contract for 150 hotel rooms during the convention week in that city, and that he had informed his lieutenants that no more funds would be furnished for political operations. It had been understood here for some time that Hearst was nearly at the end of his string, so far as spending money for delegates was concerned, and that the hour was near at hand when he would find it necessary to cut off his campaign expenses and husband his resources in taking care of his newspaper enterprises. 
