# MUNICIPAL FIGURES---No.3 DEATH OF EX-ALD. BENNET

Well-Known Citizen Passes Away on Christmas Day After a Long Illness.

After an illness extending over many months, but which only recently assumed an aggravated form, Mr. Robert W. Bennet passed away at his residence, No. 22 Peter street, last evening. Mr. Bennet was for many years a well-known resident of the city, and had many friends who will regret to hear of his death. He was for a long period manager of the Bennet Furniture Company, East London, prior to the closing of that concern a few months ago. He took a keen interest in municipal affairs, and despite pressure of private business, served as an alderman for several years. He especially guarded the interests of the east end while at the council board, and it was largely through his efforts that the Rectory street line of the street railway was laid, and it was also due to him in no small measure that the company was prevented from abandoning the line a few years since. As manager of the London branch of the Bennet Company, he was a large employer of labor, and it was among the workmen particularly that he was known for his liberality. 
