Prices on the Local Square To-day Remained Unchanged.

HAY SOLD AT \$13 A TON

This Appears To Be the Fixed Price Now—Live Hogs Are Slightly Higher Now.

There was very little fruit on sale this morning, all last week's stock being cleared off by the strong Saturday market.

Prices remain the same, but it would be difficult to say just what change may occur tomorrow.

New shipments for this week will come in this afternoon or tomorrow morning.

Thirteen dollars per ton seems to have become the fixed price for hay, practically everything going off the market at this figure.

Hay is coming in in moderate quantities, and the demand is firm.

Straw is offered occasionally, and sells for \$6.50 and \$7 per ton.

Live hogs are slightly higher, shipments being made at \$8.65 or \$8.75 per cwt.
