

TAKEN FROM TRAIN WITH DREAD DISEASE

A Case of Cerebro-Spinal Fever Found at North Bay.

North Bay, Ont., March 30. — A few days ago a young Greek was taken from a passenger train at North Bay. Very ill. The doctor who attended him was surprised to find that his symptoms suggested cerebro-spinal fever, the disease which caused two ocean steamships to be tied up in New York harbor under rigid quarantine, and which is dreaded for its malignant qualities and contagiousness.
A test was made from the patient, and a report submitted by Toronto laboratories' specialists confirm the diagnosis as cerebro-spinal fever. The Greek died after an illness of a few days and was buried in a local cemetery, unnamed and unknown. During his treatment in North Bay he was rigidly quarantined and watched carefully.

SENATOR COFFEY ON 8-HOUR BILL

Supports It as a Measure of Justice to Workers.

MODERN WEAR AND TEAR

Demand on Labor Greater Than in the Past, and Toilers Should Have More Leisure—Two Classes of Employers.

Following is the Hansard report of the speech of Senator Coffey on the Government's bill, which provides an eight-hour day for work on public buildings:
Hon. Mr. Coffey: I listened with attention, indeed I may say with pleasure, to the argument of the honorable member from Halifax (Hon. Mr. Power) on Thursday last, when the eight-hour bill was under discussion. And when he brought his remarks to a close I felt he had made out a good case against the provisions of the proposed legislation.
The honorable member almost convinced me that the passage of the eight-hour bill would avail but little, as, similar legislation had met the same fate at the hands of the honorable lords who compose the King's Privy Council.

The honorable member from Halifax was followed by the honorable member from Montreal (Hon. Mr. Dandurand), another gentleman who gives but little resting time to statutory volumes. The argument of the honorable member from Halifax presented new ground for thought, and my conception of the inhumanity of the modern laborer is, in many ways, somewhat disturbed. His legal armor had been pierced in many places. Thereupon I resolved to keep an open mind after hearing one able pleader until such time as I had an opportunity of grasping the situation as presented by another able pleader. I have, therefore, declined to strike out for myself, and take a layman's risk. I do not recognize anything in the proposed bill which might be considered to fall foul of elementary justice. No one will question the right to legislate against child labor. It was quite just and of necessity to place the protecting arm of the law about children of tender years who were to be lured from their homes to work in the factories of the money-mad people who thought by day and dreamt by night only of schemes to enlarge the bulk of their deposit slips, gulped seldom if ever by thought of the general welfare of their fellows. Believe me I do not wish to make rash statements. I speak of a class.

Two Classes of Employers.
Far be it from me to put in this category those noble men who stand as the head of our great enterprises. I speak of the few thousand desperadoes who, by their insatiable greed, by the worship of the gold bug, by their money in the taller as but a cog in the wheel that grinds them wealth by the sweat of their hands, when the word justice is spoken, bring dishonor upon the class to which they belong, and foment dissension amongst the toilers.
There are men within this chamber, even within the reach of my voice—regards of industry, if I may call them such—who have never experienced the strife and anger of the workmen.

T. AND N. O. TRAINMEN SMUGGLED WHISKEY

Running Contraband Liquor Into Cochran Paid Well.

North Bay, March 30. — The remunerative business of running liquor into dry districts has resulted in two train crews on the T. and N. O. Railway being dismissed from the service. Two conductors and four brakemen were caught smuggling liquor into the dry zone of the province, and were fined \$100 each. Railway officials have suspected that some of the trainmen were connected with underground contraband routes, and detectives were placed on the case, with the result as stated. No arrests have been made, as the inquiry was purely a railway investigation, and the provincial police had nothing to do with it. Several of the men implicated have left town for fear, it is said, that prosecutions will follow. Six cases of whiskey were found in one van, which indicates the extent of the traffic.
