TO ENRICH BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER

General Synod Will Appoint a
Committee for Purpose.

SOME OBJECTION TAKEN

Many Delegates Could Not See the
Necessity for the Naming of
the Committee.

The report of the committee on
Prayer Book enrichment and adapta-
tion was discussed at length at the
afternoon session of the synod yester-
day. Many diverse views were
expressed on the subject, and the
entire afternoon was given over to
the discussion.

Hon. S. H. Blake objected strenu-
ously to the use of the word "enrich-
ment" as "an insult to the grand old
book." He hoped that no alterations
would be made.

The report of the committee recom-
mended that the difference of condi-
tions in Canada and England, and the
difference of outlook between the
present time and 300 years ago, made
advisable a conservative change in the
Prayer Book.

Canon Cody thought there was a
need of adapting the Prayer Book to
some degree to the case of those
who do not conform to the Church of
England services.

Other members of the synod took
strong exception to this view of the
canon's.

Looking to Canada.
Canon Davidson said that the
Church in England was looking to the
Canadian church to take some steps
in revising the Prayer Book, and in
Canada both clergy and laymen were
calling loudly for the revision.

Archdeacon Pentreath thought in-
action at this time would be worse
than a blunder. It would be a crime,
he said, to do nothing.

The church revised its
services in 250 years was facing a
serious problem, that was bound to
become more acute in the future.

Canon Murray favored a broad
revision as possible.

No Drastic Changes.

Canon Scott wanted the assurance
that nothing drastic would be done.
The Church of England, he said, rep-
resented very different schools of
thought, and all should be treated
considerately.

Dean Williams favored revision, but
feared that in time it would tend to
separate the different schools of An-
glican thought.

Dean Paget, of Calgary, pointed out
that a difficulty would arise through
the Canadian Prayer Book, in addition
to the hymn book, being available to
newcomers from the old land.

Some objected to consulting experts
in regard to the revision. Archdeacon
Inglis thought the committee in
charge should secure all the expert
advice possible. "The men we wish
to avoid," he said, "are those who
think they know it all."

Chancellor Conyngham, of Lethbridge,
pointed out the necessity of unanim-
ity of spirit before any marked change
could be made.

Chancellor Davidson wanted a dis-
tinct legislation to the effect that
whatever changes might be made,
they would involve no change in the
principles or doctrine of the Church
of England in Canada, and that in
any adaptation, enrichment or re-
vision, no change either in text or
rubric should be introduced which
would involve a change of doctrine
or principles, it being understood that
the ornaments Rubric be left un-
touched.

Resolution Adopted.
The resolution that at length met
the favor of the synod, which all the
afternoon had expressed very diver-
gent views, provided:

"That a joint committee of both
houses of the General Synod be ap-
pointed to prepare or compile such
revisions and such adaptations of the
rubrics and words of the Book of
Common Prayer as are necessary to
meet the requirements of the Church
of England in Canada, and that in
any adaptation, enrichment or re-
vision, no change either in text or
rubric shall be introduced which will
involve or imply a change of doctrine
or principles, it being understood that
the ornaments Rubric be left un-
touched."

Archdeacon Fortin saw no reason for
mentioning the ornaments Rubric.
He wanted to know had it been at-
tacked, or was it in any imminent
peril.

Other members of the synod took
the view of the synod, which all the
afternoon had expressed very diver-
gent views, provided:

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vision, no change either in text or

Evening Session.
The entire evening session of the
general synod last night was given
over to what promised to be the in-
terminable discussion of a report on
the arrangements for the publication
of the new Prayer Book. The report
of the new and revised Prayer Book
in mon Prayer. Some of the discus-
sions included in were none too friendly,
and the committee responsible for en-
tering into a contract with an English
publisher were openly criticised by
some members of the synod for ex-
ceeding in the opinion of their critics,
the authority given to them by the
synod. Half a dozen or more amend-
ments to the motion brought in by the
committee were introduced and voted
upon by the house. All were lost how-
ever, and it was nearly midnight when
the house broke up after finally pass-
ing the original motion, providing for
the publication of the Prayer Book as
arranged for.

A Memorial.
Last night a memorial was read
from the diocese of Quebec, asking
that instead of making alterations or
revisions in the body of the Prayer
Book an appendix be published to
contain special prayers, services or
adaptations for the Canadian church.
The claim was advanced that the
Prayer Book is a bond of union
throughout the Empire, and the unity
of the Church of England might be
endangered by alterations. By an al-
most unanimous vote, however, a
clause was carried that whatever
changes might be made, should be in-
serted in the body of the book in the
places where they are most appropri-
ate.

When the report of the arrange-
ments for the publication of the Pray-
er Book was presented, Hon. S. H.
Blake objected to the high royalties
to be paid to the synod, and favored
a lower price to the public. A con-
