**SPLENDID RECEPTION**

FOR MR. FRIEDHEIM

His Unaffected Style and Wonderful Ability Captivated the Audience.

Mr. Arthur Friedheim added fresh laurels to his crown Thursday evening when he appeared for the first time before a London audience. Despite the unpleasant evening, the Auditorium was well filled, and Mr. Friedheim could certainly ask for no better reception than that accorded him by local music lovers.

At the conclusion of each of the three portions of his exceptionally well-arranged program, Mr. Friedheim was applauded repeatedly. His rendition would be satisfied with nothing else than an encore upon each occasion.

Mr. Russell G. McLean, who shared the honors of the evening, was found to possess a very pleasing baritone, but owing to a heavy cold could scarcely do himself justice and was obliged to omit two of his finest numbers. Nevertheless, he was warmly received. His rendition of "Invictus" and "The Snuggler's Song" was capital, and in lighter vein he pleased his hearers immensely with "Oie March Win" and "Munich's Song."

One thing especially pleasing about Mr. Friedheim's playing was its unaffectedness. There was none of the mannerisms or poses so often seen in a great artist. His skill at the piano is marvellous and displayed a rare understanding not only of the compositions of Liszt, with whom he studied for several years, but also of Beethoven, Chopin, and other great masters. Friedheim's wonderful sweep of octave and chord playing, and his brilliant finger-work were at all times superb. His second selection, Beethoven's Sonata Appassionata, and his final number from Liszt's Don Juan, gave ample scope for his marvellous technique and his playing, ranging from the softest of pianissimos to volumes of deepest sound.

Friedheim surely deserves his title of "artist" and his rare talent has placed him amongst the foremost ranks of pianists today. His hearers were certainly delighted.

**FOURTEEN CARTS FOR INCINERATION**

Details of Proposed Scheme of Collection Submitted By Engineer.

**HOW COST IS DIVIDED**

Equipment for Gathering Garbage Will Require \$10,000 of Amount Granted.

At the meeting of the board of works held Thursday night Engineer Brazier was instructed to make an immediate examination of the sidewalks, laid this year by Contractor Anthistle, and also those sidewalks which were laid in 1907, on which the guarantee expires this year.

Mr. Anthistle has been stopped from further work for the city until the engineer has reported upon those walks which he has already completed. Although City Solicitor Meredith states that the companies which laid the sidewalks are responsible for the repairs even after the time that their guarantee expires, if it can be proved that the specifications were not followed at the time of construction, the board of the opinion that an examination should be made this fall so as to avoid all possible chances of legal action.

Heating System for Hospital.  
An application was received from the hospital trust asking that the hospital be heated by steam from the incinerator when that building is in operation, and that the city council take steps to have the piping system for the conducting of the steam from one building to the other installed as soon as possible. The total cost of such a system will be \$11,000. Mr. S. L. Davis, local representative of the John-Manville Company, presented the plans of the system of his company, and Engineer Brazier was instructed to investigate and report at the next meeting of the committee.

Alid Moore and Mayor Graham will confer with the city solicitor and the finance committee as to the most satisfactory method of meeting this additional item of expense.

Equipment for Incinerator.  
Engineer Brazier submitted a report on the garbage collection, in which he made a number of suggestions that will be seriously considered when that system is installed. Of the \$50,000 set aside for the incinerator and the garbage system, \$39,900 will be used for the construction and equipment of the building and \$10,100 for the collection of the refuse. He suggested that the following equipment would be the most satisfactory, considering the amount of money at hand: Fourteen single-horse two-wheeled carts, \$780; fourteen horses, \$3,420; twelve sets of harness, \$360; stables, \$4,500; a boiler, \$1,000; and buckets for collection, \$40.

A special meeting of the council will be held this afternoon to consider the request of the company furnishing the equipment for the incinerator for a payment upon the presentation of the bill of lading. No record of the equipment which has arrived in the city has been received by the engineer, and the council requested to furnish such a statement for the meeting this afternoon.

An assistant engineer will also be appointed at the meeting today, and Mr. Dumford, who is employed in the drainage department of the city engineer's office, Toronto, Mr. Dumford is highly recommended by Engineer Brazier.

**No Stands for Newsboys.**  
A communication from the newsboys of the city requesting the council to furnish them with stands on the main streets, was filed.

Those present were: Chairman Robinson, Mayor Graham, Ald. Coles and Ald. Moore.
