JURY CLEARS STRIKERS OF A MURDER CHARGE

Ettor, Giovannitti and Caruso, Who Led Salem Strike, Found Not Guilty.

[Canadian Press.]

Salem, Mass., Nov. 26.—"Not guilty" is the verdict of the jury in the case of Joseph J. Ettor, Arturo Giovannitti and Joseph Caruso, for the murder of Anna Lipozzi, who was killed in a Lawrence textile strike riot last winter.

When the three men had heard the words freeing them from the awful charge, they embraced and kissed each other in the prisoners' cage. Giovannitti then sprang to his feet: "Gentlemen of the jury," he said, "I thank you not only for myself but in the name of my companions. I also feel impelled to thank the court for the fair manner this trial has been conducted. The thanks we offer is not only yours, but thanks in the name of the working class."

The trial of Joseph J. Ettor, member of the executive committee of the Industrial Workers of the World; Arturo Giovannitti, a socialist writer,

of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Joseph Caruso, a millworker, came about in consequence of the strike in the textile mills in Lawrence, Mass., suddenly precipitated Jan. 12 last, and continued for two months. Ettor and Giovannitti were accused as accessories before the fact to the murder of Anna Lipozzi, who was killed in a street riot. The commonwealth maintained that they incited the riot in which the woman met her death by inflammatory speeches to the strikers. Caruso was accused, with Salvatore Scuto, who has never been apprehended, with actual participation in the riot.

HAMILTON BYLAW TO REDUCE THE LICENSES

Electors Will Be Asked to Cut Number From Fifty-seven to Thirty-eight.

Hamilton, Nov. 26.—The city council this evening passed a bylaw for submission to the people next January to cut the number of liquor licenses from 57 to 30. Mayor Lees said a good bylaw would bring prosperity to the city. He hoped they would all work for it. On a division of 13 to 7, the council decided against the election of a hydro-electric commission next January, and the election will not take place until next May.

RAPS FOR BORDEN NAVAL PROGRAM

Nation Prints Protest Against Endeavor to Induce All Empire to Arm.

London, Nov. 25.—The Nation contains a wholehearted protest against the "vigilant" endeavor to induce, intimidate or compel all parts of the Empire to arm, and says the younger nations of the Empire are thereby drawn into the vortex of the old. It incidentally trounces Borden for seeking to scare dollars from his countrymen. It proceeds: "If these benevolences were really a spontaneous proceeding from a reasoned colonial policy, we would regard them with unqualified favor; the net result, though, will be to inspire Germany with new suspicions of our eagerness to increase our naval superiority."

Today's Times insists Britain must never be suspected of saving money for domestic programs by shifting part of Britain's burden as a European power to the shoulders of the Dominion Governments.

In the Chronicle, P. E. Baker, who, the paper says, has just spent three months in Canada, declares although it is a hard thought there is too much evidence that the English Tory, Canadian manufacturer and American trust king have combined together in joining investment, money and lung power for exploitation of the British flag.

They preach the flag in every form, from licking Germany to "no truck or trade" with Yankees, by the simple variation of prejudice and passion. They know well enough to keep the passion at white heat and prejudice ascendant is the only way to heat recalcitancy, so, as they think, to keep intact their protective tariff.

Against the American producer intrigue has achieved in a measure success. Canada becoming bravely ingolistic; they nearly all forget, since Canada achieved self-government, she reaped no benefit from the British fleet because there has been no enemy to protect her from; they never dream the British fleet has been trebled in a dozen years to satisfy the moloch of war; never realize they have no "debt" because they have been paying taxes for development of Canada's material resources, and so building up the power of Empire more truly than a world of Dreadnoughts could.

PRESS DENOUNCES NEW WAR RUMORS

All London Newspapers Comment on Latest Balkan Crisis.

MUST CURB SERVIAN

King Peter's Ambitions Must Not Be Permitted to Bring on Great Conflict.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Nov. 26.—A special cable from London says: The press here is almost unanimous in denouncing the alarmist reports foreshadowing a general European war over a strip of land for Serbia on the Adriatic Sea.

The Daily Telegraph says: "All the great nations are working harmoniously to insure tranquility, and are resolved to defer the awkward problems until the time comes when the whole situation must be considered."

The Daily News says: "A satisfactory feature in the messages this morning from Berlin, Vienna and St. Petersburg alike is the clear assurance that neither Germany, Austria nor Russia will willingly engage in war for the sake of the claims which Serbia is obstinately advancing."

The Daily Mail says: "The friends and patrons of Serbia will be able to convince King Peter and his ministers that the calamity of a European war will not be allowed to ensue on account of Serbia's ambitions and designs."

The Daily Express says: "There is no justification for extravagant alarms. The proper issue is a conference capable of flanking a wise settlement in a spirit of reason and substantial justice."

The Daily Mirror says: "There is in the European situation nothing to justify any alarm. With those words almost every human being in London, Paris, Berlin, Vienna, St. Petersburg and Rome will agree."

The Morning Post says: "It is the height of folly for Serbia to put to the hazard all she has won for the sake of gratifying her extravagant ambitions."

The Pall Mall Gazette says: "We are able to say with confidence that the intentions of the powers remain peaceful. All are continuing to work for peace."

The Westminster Gazette says: "It will be an absurdity if one such question as the access of Serbia to the sea should even dream of Russia coming to blows with Austria. Austria dragging in Germany, and Russia dragging in France and Great Britain, Mad as the world may be, it is not so bad as that."

The Standard says: "If the money markets can be frightened into the belief that the great powers are on the brink of war the bears will rejoice exceedingly."

The Daily News says: "It is unthinkable that Serbia's desire for a port on the Adriatic rather than on the Aegean should be allowed to provoke an appalling conflict."

City Store Yard an Eyesore and Detriment to Property

People in the Vicinity of Horton and Waterloo Streets Register a Complaint—Fence Should Be Erected to Hide the Rubbish.

Residents of the vicinity of Horton and Waterloo streets are denouncing the action of the city of London in turning the vacant land around the Michigan Central roundhouse into a store yard, and thereby injuring property in the neighborhood.

In all directions the houses are of a neat, substantial character, some of them but a few years old, and yet the city has created an eyesore in the neighborhood which is a detriment to realty.

All the old flagstones which were torn from the walks of the main streets some months ago, were broken up and thrown in unsightly piles on the boulevard on the corner of Waterloo and Horton streets.

There is not even a fence to hide the rubbish, and to make matters worse, watering carts that have been used to oil the streets, and which present a most deplorable and neglected appearance, are allowed to stand in the open, and in sight of the residents and passersby.

Citizens who live in the neighborhood declare that the city of London puts forth a very bad example to the people of the city to be neat and to take care of their property.

DISPATCHES FROM THE TUNNEL

HUB AND SPOKE FACTORY SWEEPED AWAY BY FLAMES

Loss in Early Morning Blaze Will Reach \$100,000—Poor Water Pressure Handicapped the Firemen Greatly and Fire Got Beyond Control.

Sarnia, Nov. 26.—The factory of the Sarnia Hub and Spoke Company, situated on Front street, was completely destroyed by fire, which was discovered about 2:30 this morning. The flames were noticed by the telephone operators in the Port Huron office, who at once called Sarnia.

The fire had made considerable headway, and the brigade was tremendously handicapped by a defective hydrant and then poor water pressure. The streams available were similar to those of a garden hose. The two-story structure of wood and frame construction, together with a large stock of wood and much valuable machinery, was completely destroyed.

The loss is estimated at about \$100,000, and is practically covered by insurance.

When the blaze was at its height the wind carried such a shower of sparks toward the county building, 200 yards away, that the roof caught. This fire was soon put out.

The tugs of the Reid Company were at the scene of the fire early and lent very valuable help with their fire equipment. The Grand Trunk yard engines were run up hurriedly and succeeded in getting all loaded and empty cars out of the sidings safely.

The factory was owned by the Loughheed estate. Harry Loughheed is manager.

Boats Came Into Sarnia Covered With Frozen Spray.

BECKER'S FOUR GUNMEN SENTENCED TO THE CHAIR

"Gyp the Blood," "Whitey Lewis," "Lefty Louie" and "Dago Frank" To Die in January.

New York, Nov. 26.—"Gyp the Blood," "Whitey Lewis," "Lefty Louie" and "Dago Frank," the gunmen convicted of the murder of Herman Rosenthal, were sentenced by Justice Goff today to die in the electric chair at Sing Sing during the winter of 1913.

Each of the prisoners was sentenced separately, and in each case their counsel moved that the verdict be set aside and the judgment be arrested. Each motion Justice Goff successively denied. One of the grounds for counsel's motion was that the jury had actually deliberated less than half an hour and that the verdict was the result of "passion, prejudice and other influences."

When they heard their doom pronounced, none of the condemned men gave any visible outward sign of his feelings. Accompanied by Sheriff Harburger and twelve deputies, the four men were forced through a big, silent crowd outside the criminal courts building, thrust into the Black Maria, and taken to the Federal Central station, and caught the 11:55 a.m. train for Sing Sing. This is the train that Charles Becker took on his ride to the death house. He is to die in the chair during the week of Dec. 9.

JUDGE REFUSED TO TRY MERCANTILE CASE

Was Former Shareholder of Company Charged With Wrongful Act.

[Canadian Press.]

Kingston, Nov. 26.—Stating that he was a former shareholder of the company, Hon. Justice Britton refused to try the case of the Saskatchewan Land and Homestead Company, Limited, vs. John T. Moore, the first case on the docket on the non-jury basis, which opened Monday afternoon. The plaintiffs' claim is for money wrongfully received by the defendant from plaintiffs and not accounted for, and for money due by defendant to plaintiffs, and for damages for wrongful acts of the defendant in transferring lands of the plaintiffs to one Annie A. Moore. The defendant has a counter claim for at least \$25,000 for services rendered plaintiffs.

The plaintiffs asked that the case be tried in Napanee, while defendant asked that it be tried in Toronto. Decision was reserved until Friday, and in the meantime the parties interested will get together to decide where the case will be heard.

Only one of the dead remains unidentified.

The fact that all of the persons in or directly outside of the building at the time the explosion occurred were not killed made the blast appear freakish. The heap of debris, twisted iron and shattered wooden beams was proof that those who were not instantly killed had escaped as if by a miracle. Firemen and police are still working in the ruins in search of more bodies.

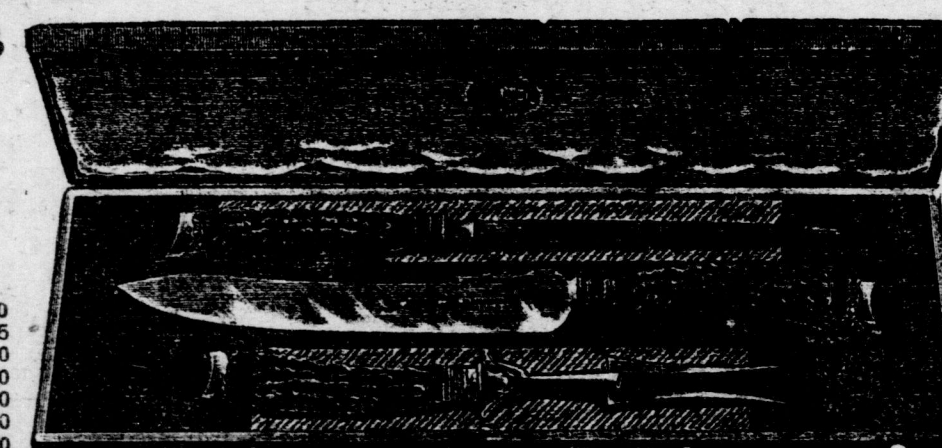
