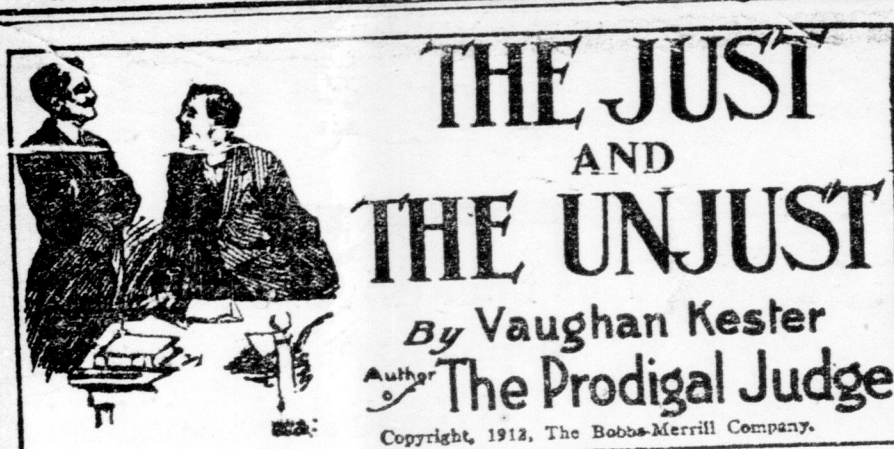

Bessie: I have constantly advised against the use of hair-bleaches and dyes.

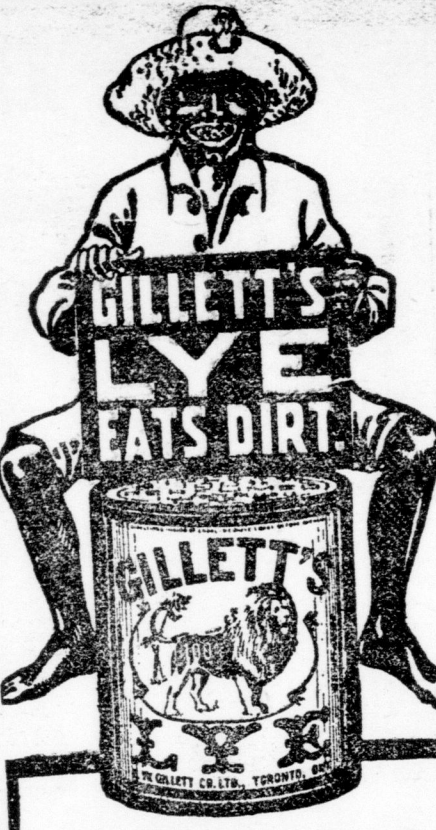

Miss Wood: Plenty of good lather is an essential to the success of any shampoo. Some soaps that lather well make the hair brittle and hard. It is better to use plain cantharox for shampooing purposes. Simply dissolve a teaspoonful of cantharox in a cupful of hot water and stir well until it is dissolved.

Margie: Indeed, I am always glad to repeat a recipe. The wrinkle-removing formula which your friend says is in these columns and found absolute in its action is easily and cheaply made at home by mixing one ounce of almond oil with one-half pint of cold water and adding two teaspoonfuls of glycerine. Chicago, April 29.—Patrolman Wm. H. Ohm was named as the silent leader of a gang of seven burglars in a confession by three of the alleged thieves yesterday.

The three men were arrested and taken to the city hall, where Assistant Chief of Police Schuetzler cut the buttons off their coats and took them to the court today with the men who say he was their partner.

Information that the officer was in league with crooks was brought to the assistant chief by attorneys for the accused men. Experts to Test Dr. Duket's Cure For Tuberculosis

Washington, April 29.—Former Senator William Lorimer, of Illinois, today will appeal to the United States public health service to detail at least one of its experts to inquire into the alleged "cure" for tuberculosis, said to have been discovered by Dr. Peter P. Duket, of Chicago.

Dr. Lorimer expressed confidence in the Chicago physician's discovery. He declared that more than 100 cases are being treated successfully and that the treatment used by Duket has been approved by the committee of the most prominent physicians in Chicago. So anxious is Mr. Lorimer to have the Government inquire into the matter, he has announced his willingness to bear the expense of sending a federal expert to make the investigation.

The public health service now is engaged in an investigation of the alleged "cure" of Dr. Friedrich F. Friedman. An inquiry into the Duket treatment will probably also be made.

Police Inspectors Face Graft Charge

New York, April 29.—Four former police inspectors, charged indirectly with grafting, directly with conspiracy to obstruct justice, today faced a grand jury in the city hall.

The defendants, Dennis Sweeney, James E. Hickey, James P. Thompson and John J. Murphy, were all indicted recently after the district attorney's office had uncovered a system of grafting against disorderly houses.

In this connection two former police men, Hartigan and Robinson, have already been sent to Sing Sing. They were formerly attached to Sweeney's staff. Both went to prison refusing to "squelch."

The men placed on trial today are charged with conspiring to keep out of the state George A. Sipp, a hotelkeeper, whose confession to paying tribute money to the police, forms the basis of the prosecution.
