[Canadian Press.] BERLIN, Feb. 4.—(By wireless telegraphy to Sayville, L.I.) - The German Admiralty issued today the following Entire Question To Be Dis-

"The waters around Great Britain and Ireland, including the whole English Channel, are declared a war zone from and after February 18, 1915.

"Every enemy merchantship found in this water zone will be destroyed, even if it is impossible to avert dangers which threaten the crew and passengers.

"Also, neutral ships in the war zone are in danger, as in consequence of the misuse of neutral flags ordered by the British Government on January 31, and in view of the hazards of naval warfare, it cannot always be avoided that attacks meant for enemy ships endanger neutral ships.

"Shipping northward, around the Shetland Islands in the eastern basin of the North Sea, and in a strip of at least 30 nautical miles in breadth along the Dutch coast, Government control of sugar importais endangered in the same way."


