Six Men Buried In Mine Cave-in

All Believed Killed in Joplin, Mo., Disaster.

Joplin, Mo., June 11.—Six men were buried beneath tons of water, earth and rocks in the Longacre-Chapman mine near here late last night, when they cut into a drift of an abandoned mine. A seventh man was rescued after being picked up and hurried nearly 700 feet by the force of the cave-in. The six are believed to have been instantly killed.

C. M. A. President Predicts Trade Agreement at End of War.

Toronto, June 11.—J. P. Sherrard, of Montreal, president of the C. M. A., made an important statement at a luncheon yesterday afternoon at the Royal Canadian Yacht Club. Commenting on future trade opportunities in Canada, he said:

"There are good reasons for expecting that at the close of the war a trade agreement will be arranged between the Allies that will include Canada, and if things done we will have a possible customer in Russia alone that will greatly benefit Canadian industry, and that should make British Columbia a manufacturing province of the first rank."

GETS HUSH MONEY; ROBBED IN FLIGHT

Manitoba Government Agent Soon Loses \$10,000 Given to Him.

SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE

"Missing Witness" and Architect Horwood Give Startling Testimony.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 10. — V. W. Horwood, formerly Manitoba's provincial architect, gave evidence before a royal commission here this afternoon. His testimony was so sensational that William Salt, the missing witness, who was produced before the commission, A. J. Andrews, senior counsel for the Manitoba government, before Mr. Horwood began his evidence, stated that outside of Manitoba the commission had no power to administer an oath. Chief Justice Mathers said he thought the oath should be administered, as the moral effect, no doubt, would be of considerable effect, but he extended the witness immunity from the effects of his statements in any possible action. Horwood stated that Hon. Mr. Caldwell told him that Salt's books containing a report of the depths and dimensions of the caissons, would not work out right with Kelly's application for payments. Acting on the advice of W. A. Elliott, inspector of the buildings, and Caldwell, Horwood called Salt into the office and got him to make a copy of the book. Horwood went to see Caldwell, and told the ex-minister that the book would not tally with the applications. He was then told by Mr. Caldwell he had better have the book fixed.

Asked to Adjust Figures.

"I went to Salt and asked him to re-write it and adjust the figures. I told him the depths shown would not tally with the figures we had put into our estimates," said Horwood. He told Caldwell that he "did not think it would go down with the committee" (public accounts), and he was advised to go right with Kelly's applications for Horwood also testified that Caldwell said Elliott would have to sign the three applications for payment which did not bear his signature.

He then told of getting in touch with Salt after he had gone away, and of the agreement to the aliases in order to enable them to correspond without anyone detecting their moves. It was planned, he said, that Salt should come back and stand by his figures. Salt was to go over his figures with Elliott in Minneapolis and Elliott was to find out what it would cost to get the testimony destroyed. "Witness corroborated Elliott's story in the matter of the \$500. Horwood said he told Caldwell about the \$500 and what it was for, and he expected that Caldwell would refund it. Caldwell instructed him to endeavor to keep Salt away and Horwood therefore got in touch with M. G. Hook and arranged for a trip to Chicago. On Caldwell's instructions Horwood called

at Dr. Simpson's office and was given a parcel which was said to contain \$500. This parcel was sent to Salt. Witness said he frequently saw Mr. Kelly in the parliament buildings while the public accounts committee was in session, and had a number of conversations with him on Salt's absence. Kelly's opinion was that it was poor policy to keep Salt away.

Salt Gets \$10,000.

After telling of the return of Elliott, Horwood, said Salt, was contemplating a trip to New York, so he again sent Hook to Minneapolis, who just caught Salt. Horwood, said Salt, wanted more money and Caldwell gave him \$500, which he sent to him. Hook had a third interview with Salt, and this time Salt was anxious to return to Winnipeg. On learning of the fact Horwood reported it to Caldwell and received instructions to find out how much Salt wanted to keep away. Salt's price was \$10,000. At first Caldwell said the price was ridiculous, but he thought he could raise \$5,000. Salt, however, stuck out and finally Caldwell said he would raise the money. It was done and Horwood got the money from Caldwell in bills, and gave it to M. G. Hook.

Horwood, said Salt, went to M. G. Hook, who said they should keep Salt away at any risk. "He told me," said Horwood, "to ask how much it would cost to keep him away. I said I would suggest what I had before—that two or three thousand would do. He said no, it was not good. I said well, what was enough? Hook said, \$10,000. I told him it was out of the question, but I went to see Mr. Caldwell about it. He said he would raise \$5,000, but no more. Three or four days later Hook approached me again and said Salt was coming back. I told Mr. Caldwell and he said he would see if he could raise the money. He said he and Mr. Howden were going to do it. I was told to go up there again the same afternoon and I did so. The money was given me in bills. Mr. Caldwell gave me the money, \$10,000, in bills.

Robbed of His Money.

"Hook was going to Denver with it, but in Omaha he was attacked and robbed, and he lost all the money." Mr. Salt was called as a witness. He was shown and remembered the famous black book. He had a conversation with Mr. Horwood about it before he left Winnipeg, when Horwood asked him to make the quantities fit with the amounts paid. Salt said he worked at a new book and Horwood at the old one, until Horwood realized the new book was better than the old one. Horwood then asked him to make a new one. In reply to a question the witness stated Horwood was erasing figures. Salt said Horwood asked him to make every caisson shown as resting on hardpan look as though it rested on rock. Witness identified alterations in the black book as the work of Horwood.

On Friday, March 13, Horwood told witness he had better take a holiday, handing him \$250. He had not seen Horwood since. He stayed in Minneapolis some days, then went to Madison and Chicago. By appointment at La Salle Hotel, Chicago, Elliott visited him, saying he was special representative of the Government. "Things were in bad shape in Winnipeg," Elliott said.

Refuses to Commit Perjury.

Elliott told him to fix his price for giving false evidence about the caissons to be built for the name one, two or three thousand. Salt said he would not commit perjury for a hundred thousand, but would come back and say as little as he could. Elliott sent off the wire saying everything could be made "O.K." for two or three thousand. Elliott had given him \$500 in \$20 American bills and when Hook came he gave him \$300 more. After a little longer, witness went back to Minneapolis, where he learned the Royal Commission had been appointed. He received more money, and Hook suggested his going to New York, but he went to Denver instead. He heard nothing from Hook further, except that he had had a bad accident in Omaha which obliged Hook's return to Winnipeg. Salt then went to Idaho Springs for a few days.

A month elapsed with no word from Hook, so he wired Elliott saying he was coming home. At St. Paul he reserved accommodations to Winnipeg, but a gentleman, introducing himself as Mr. Holwood, an attorney, came to see him, and said he had been instructed from Winnipeg to advise Salt not to return. If he did the Government would turn on him. He advised witness to accept more money and extend his holiday. This was May 26. Holwood introduced a man he did not know, who paid him \$5,000 in American bills.

Witness was asked why he was paid that amount. "To leave, I suppose, and stay away," answered Salt.

WINGHAM FARMERS REPLANTING CORN

Some Early Crops Killed Out by Frost—Caterpillars Busy Again.

Wingham, Ont., June 11.—Alderman F. L. Binkley and other officers of the sport and amusement committee here have about completed arrangements for a Dominion Day program, which will be given here on Victoria Park. Baseball and lacrosse against outside teams will be played, two balloon ascensions will be made, and a good program of music by the Citizens' Band will be rendered. The recent rains have been of great benefit to the crops. Fall wheat has started to fill, and timothy and clover are looking well.

Some farmers who lost corn planted early and killed off by the frost, have now got the land in shape and started to plant it over again.

There are no signs of the army worm at present, but the caterpillar is still doing the work of destroying trees in spite of the trees being sprayed. It is thought that rains had washed the liquid, and that the worms now doing the work have recently been hatched.

Sewer work is still under way, and the council met recently in order to have more work done to keep the men employed.

Heavy shipments of hogs, cattle and eggs are being sent out of town these days at fair prices.

A. H. Wilfred, who recently bought out Gunt's store, has had it renovated and equipped with the latest fire-fighting apparatus.

John Hughes, mail clerk, who has recently been on the sick list, has again resumed his duties.

Farmers are making additions to their barns and sheds as they have cultivated more land than usual and expect to have larger crops.

J. F. BOLE, M. P., TO PURCHASE ALL LIQUOR

Is Commissioner of Public Store System in Saskatchewan.

OFFICIALS FAIL TO SEE WHAT CAUSED BRYAN TO RESIGN

Nearly All Disagree With Him and Consider Note Friendly.

GIVES GERMANY CHANCE

Can Back Down With Certain Appearance of Keeping Dignity.

Washington, June 11.—With the publication today of the latest American note to Germany concerning the sinking of the Lusitania, officials of the United States Government and diplomats generally discussed among themselves the probable character of the German Government's answer. While there was no definite information, the feeling in German quarters was that a favorable response was likely, as the note seemed to open the door to a solution compatible alike with the interests of both Germany and the United States.

The note, it was said, was purposely phrased so that it would give Germany an opportunity to meet the wishes of the United States with dignity and in conformity with German public opinion. Many officials wondered why Secretary Bryan declined to sign the note, which they regarded as friendly in tone and carrying many expressions of good-will. They claimed its friendliness was the very means that had been suggested—persuasion to accomplish the American purpose. Almost everybody in official circles disagreed with Mr. Bryan that the note might lead to war.

Officials today settled down to await Germany's answer, which was not looked for for ten days or two weeks.

Official advice received here said the note, which had been considerably delayed in transmission, had been received by the United States in Berlin.

It was to be presented today to Herr Von Jagow, the German foreign secretary. It is expected here, however, that Germany will await the arrival of Meyer Gerhard, personal representative of Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, who now is en route to Berlin, to outline the attitude of the American Government, before making response.

The note which brought on the crisis in President Wilson's cabinet and culminated in the resignation of William J. Bryan as secretary of state, although friendly in character, firmly renews previous demands that the German Government give assurances that American lives and vessels shall hereafter be safeguarded.

What action the United States will take in the event that Germany refuses to give such assurances is not indicated in the note.

All irrelevant.

The note further declares that in the view of the United States Government the contention that the Lusitania was carrying contraband of war, or that these munitions were exploded by the torpedo, "are irrelevant to the question of the legality of the methods used by the German naval authorities in sinking the vessel."

"It is upon this principle of humanity," the note adds, "as well as upon the law founded on this principle, that the United States must stand."

The note informs Germany that it must have been misinformed when it assumed that the Lusitania carried guns, but the opportunity is given to Germany to submit any evidence that American officials did not execute their tasks thoroughly in inspecting the Lusitania before sailing.

SHOOTS HIS FIANCEE; THEN COMMITS SUICIDE

Terrible Act of Swede, Supposed To Be of Noble Family.

New York, June 11.—Frederick J. Hussenolt, said to be a member of a Swedish noble family, but estranged from his relatives, today fired two bullets from an automatic pistol into the heart of his fiancée, Anna Malmquist, a young music teacher, and then sent one into his own brain.

A Central Park policeman heard the three shots while he was passing a point near Sixty-fourth street. He found the couple clasped in each other's arms. The pistol was in Hussenolt's hand.

Russians Clear the Van Region of Turk Troops

Khalil Bey's Original Corps Annihilated—Turk Offensive Ends.

ST. PETERSBURG, via London, June 10.—

8:41 p.m.—Concluding a long statement on the Russian operations in the Caucasus, the general staff says:

"By the 6th of June we had captured the vast region of Van and part of the Sanjak of Mouss. We had annihilated Khalil Bey's original corps, and we had cleared of Turk troops the whole region between Lake Van and Ouza."

"On the right wing we occupied Turkish territory between the old frontier and the line of the Rivers Chorok and Tortun, and the mountain range of Tchakir Baba. An offensive which the Turks undertook in the province of Aserbaïdjan ended in a definite debacle."

WELL-KNOWN PRIEST DIES.
