ENTRANCE EXAMS WILL COST \$1800 START TUESDAY TO OIL THE ROAD TO SPRINGBANK

260 Pupils Will Write Off Tests in Various Schools.

Entrance exams for public and separate schools of this city, numbering approximately 260, commence in seven schools here next Tuesday. These pupils are those whom their respective teachers cannot recommend on term work, and exams are in order for them to qualify for certificates. Each pupil will write in his or her respective school district, with separate and public school students grouped together. Collegiate Institute teachers of London will preside at the exams.

Following are the centres throughout the city: Rectory, St. Michael's, Alexandra, Aberdeen, Lord Roberts, Talbot and Riverview. Middle and Upper School departmental examinations, on which about 250 pupils of district high schools are writing in the Technical School here, conclude next Tuesday.

George L. Dyer, Head of Big Advertis. Agency, Shoots Himself.

Calgary, June 25.—George L. Dyer, said to be a millionaire from New York, committed suicide by shooting at the sanatorium at Banff Summer Resort today. Very little is known of him. He was 32 years old, and had \$7,000 in his pocket when he took his life.

George L. Dyer, who today committed suicide at a Banff sanatorium, was head of an advertising agency here bearing his name. A telegram was received at his offices telling of his death. It was said that he had gone north for a vacation recently, after becoming rundown.

DEATH OF REV. T. C. BROWN

Brookville, June 25.—After a short illness, the death took place last night of Rev. Thomas C. Brown, a veteran of the Salvation Army.

Rev. Mr. Brown was a member of the Conference, and previously in the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church. Born at Oakwood, Ont., in 1844, he was educated there, and at Victoria College, Cobourg, and during his ministry served at Brampton, Whitby, Oakville, Granby, Carleton Place, Brockville, Winchester, Kingston, Cornwall and St. Catharines. His wife and one son, Rev. W. T. Brown, Chertsey, survive.

CARPENTIER SENDS BIRTHDAY GREETING TO JACK DEMPSEY

Atlantic City, June 25.—With his heavyweight championship contest one week away, Jack Dempsey today resumed training, after a 24-hour layoff to celebrate his 36th birthday. The champion will box this afternoon and tomorrow, and on Monday will spend another day in idleness. His workouts from now on will take place in the open-air arena instead of in the aeroplane hangar, the scene of his training on Thursday.

Dempsey is in high spirits, and shows none of the irritability that was noticeable a week ago. The champion was the guest of honor at a surprise party given him at his camp last night in remembrance of his birthday. The party was staged by the newspapermen. A jazz band, a trio of Hawaiian singers, and several vaudeville entertainers were impressed into service for the occasion. At 9 o'clock, Dempsey bade his visitors good-night. A telegram from his coming opponent, Georges Carpentier, was among the birthday messages he received.

G. T. Railroad Men Opposed To Wage Reduction

225 Employees At Mass Meeting in Labor Temple Vote Unanimously Against Acceptance of Award of Dominion Railway Board—Decision May Mean a Strike.

Without one dissenting voice more than two hundred employees of the Grand Trunk Railroad, members of District 96, Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, at a mass meeting in the Labor Temple Friday evening, voted to reject the recent 12 per cent wage reduction awarded by the Dominion Railway Board. The board's decision included in its membership clerks, stationmen, freight handlers and others. The organization is generally known as a national one, but has now three districts in the United States. Toronto is the headquarters. Two congresses now remain open for persuasion, officials of the union advise, either a board of adjustment or a strike.

To obtain the former the railroad management must agree to meet representatives from the union to discuss further claims of the men. If the board of the railroad declining to open the issue for further discussion and regard the recent award as final, the only alternative in lieu of accepting the reduction would necessarily be a strike, the men say. However, it is felt at this early stage that not unlikely a board of conciliation will follow and in event of which the question would not be raised for several weeks at least. As the wage reduction is scheduled to go into effect in the near future, and if should happen, say three or four months hence, that a decision be rendered favorable to the employees, the 12 per cent of their wages for the intervening months.

It is urged to ask to stand for this reduction," asserted W. J. McPherson of Toronto, general organizer, addressing Friday night's gathering. "Even if the railmen of the American roads accept the new scale it does not necessarily follow that we are being fairly dealt with. The cost of living in the United States has been greatly reduced in comparison to Canada, and we have other difficulties to contend with."

Opinion Not Recorded Yet.

"Then, as a matter of fact the United States workers have not as yet recorded their opinion on the problem one way or the other, and we feel in any event we should be given at least an opportunity of defending ourselves. In so doing we believe that we can justify our action by a comparison of the cost of living in the two countries."

Another feature of the situation, it is pointed out, is that Canada was in the war zone three years before the Americans, during which time our cost of living kept rising continually, and the Canadian railroads were compelled to stand this high cost before any award was made on the American side, because of any war conditions."

St. Andrews, Scotland, June 25.—Jack Hutchinson, professional of the Glenview Country Club of Chicago, had a lead of three strokes over Roger Wethered, captain of the Oxford University golf team, after they had played the first 18 holes of their match to decide the British open championship.
