The maximum charge that any physician ought to make for attending patients in any hospital is \$35 a week.

The dictum takes the form of an order to physicians and surgeons practicing in the hospital limiting fees to be charged.

"(e) Without a board of commerce the public has no organization to watch and protect its interests, while on the other side there is the most complete organization and cross-organization; manufacturers' associations, retail associations, packers' associations, and hundreds of other associations. The public, unorganized as the sands by the sea, requires a protector against the super-organization of modern business."

Need of Consumers for Protection.

Until that right is granted we will never know what the assets sor liabilities of this country are.
