ROAST PORK
The cuts of pork that are used for roasting are the loin, leg and the boned shoulder. The skin should be removed but if left on it should be cut in small squares. If too fat remove all superfluous fat and rub the entire surface with a crushed clove of garlic and salt and pepper mixed. Place on a rack in a baking pan, skin or fat side down, and set in a moderate hot oven for thirty minutes, reduce heat to a moderate oven and finish baking. At the start baste every ten minutes, after that every twenty-five minutes. Allow twenty-five minutes to the pound.

CHEESE DRESSING.
Rub the yolks and whites of two hard-boiled eggs through a sieve into a bowl that has been rubbed with a clove of crushed garlic; add two tablespoonsful of grated Canadian cheese, and rub to a smooth paste with half a cupful of olive oil; add two drops of tobacco sauce and three tablespoonsful of mild vinegar and stir until well mixed.

LEMON CREAM PIE.
Place in the top of a double-boiler one cupful of sugar, sifted with three level tablespoonsful of cornstarch and four level tablespoonsful of flour; mix well, and while stirring add one and one-quarter cupfuls of boiling water very slowly. Cook and stir constantly with a wooden spoon until it boils; place the pan over the hot water bath and beat into the mixture the slightly-beaten yolks of three eggs one at a time until the eggs are set; do not boil. Remove from the fire, stir in the grated rind and strained juice of two lemons and one tablespoonful of melted butter; cool slightly; pour into a baked pie shell, cover with a meringue made of three egg whites and two-thirds of a cup of sugar; sprinkle with sugar lightly and brown in a slow oven.
