THE HYAMS CASE.

Some Testimony of a Very Damaging Character to the Prisoners.

Blood Stains on Harry Hyams' Trowsers Which He Sent to the Dyer.

TORONTO, Nov. 9.—Startling new evi dence was produced at the trial of the Hyams brothers to-day, when five people swore to seeing a wound on Wells' forehead that had never been seen before, and that ar undertaker, his assistants, the coroner and others testified did not exist. This wound is said to have been just over the left eye, and the Crown will attempt to show that it could not have been done by the elevator, but was inflicted in the cellar by some instrument.
