BACH UTHER DEAD.

A Terrible Tragedy in a New York Barroom -The Result of a Quarrel Among Crooks.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 .- John Irving and Jack Walsh, two notorious criminals, Shepard of the employment bureau, fought in Sharg Draper's saloon this morning, and both were shot dead. Seven shots were fired. One struck Walsh, known as "John the Mick," in the right temple piercing his brain and killing him instantly.

Another struck Inving in the left side near the heart. The two bodies were found side by side near a billiard table in the rear of the saloon when the police entered. A witness that said about half past 1 Walsh was standing at the bar drinking with a friend when

said about half past 1 Walsh was standing at the bar drinking with a friend when Irving and Porter appeared at a side doer. A second later the report of a pistol was heard and a bullet whistled past Walsh striking the counter. Walsh faced Irving who advanced firing. Walsh retreated be-hind the ice box and pulled his revolver fired at Irving, the ball taking effect in his head. The bullet from Irving's pistol had already struck Walsh in the left side. They fell to the floor almost together. Porter, it is thought by the police that it was a bullet from his pistol that killed Walsh A revolver was found in his pocket after he was arrested. One of the bullets found on the floor file Porter's pistol, four chambers of which were discharged. The only reason for Irving's attack was that when Irving was in pison in Brooklyn, Walsh made the remark that he had be-trayed some prisoners who were trying to escape. Another story is that after Porter broke jail in Brooklyn Walsh acted the part of a betrayer, and was the means of his recapture. Porter and Irving were gener-ally connected in criminal exploits. They were arrested in 1878 for the Patchen avenue burglary in Brooklyn, and escaped from Raymond atreet jail but were recip-tured. They have also been considered respon-sible for the death of George Leonidas
