

WANTS PUBLICITY ON COAL PRICES

Labor Representation Committee
Discusses Question
SPECIAL MEETING CALLED
At Which Will Be Discussed
Storm Sewer Matters

The shortage of power, the coal situation and the action of No. 2 committee of the Council in recommending that \$175,000 be raised to construct storm sewers without taking a vote of the people were discussed at length by the Labor representation committee at its regular meeting last night.

It was decided to hold a special meeting two weeks from last night to take action with regard to the municipal elections, and thus deal with the storm sewer question, and on motion of H. B. Ashplant and Ald. J. Ashton the committee recommended that each local union represented take steps to bring about the publication monthly by the Government of the average cost of coal delivered on the siding at London. After a great deal of discussion no action was taken on the power situation.

OPPOSES POWER EXPORT.
Secretary Tite introduced the power question and suggested that the advisability of protesting against the export of electricity to the United States should be taken up.
Edwin Hawkins cautioned that the committee should not make any such protest without knowing all the facts of the case. He pointed out that the States might retaliate by prohibiting the export of coal to Canada.

Mr. Tite argued that Canada has sufficient coal to supply the world for 175 years and thus it could take care of domestic consumption if necessary.

One delegate said that the whole trouble with the hydro is that it is a "one man" institution. He also took the local Public Utilities Commission to task for selling appliances and taking the money when there is no power available for these.

MR. ASHPANT OBJECTS.
Delegate Ashplant objected to the charge that hydro is a "one man" business. He pointed out that his should not be stated without evidence being submitted.

It is tantamount to charging that some of the members of the provincial commission are not honest. Sir Adam Beck is a man of dominant personality, he admitted, but he was sure that the hydro system is not dominated by him alone.

Delegate Hawkins thought that an auxiliary plant should be constructed in London. It was a great mistake to allow the old electric plant to be dismantled.

J. G. Hothersall wanted to know what was the use of talking hydro radicals when there is not sufficient power to supply the present customers. He also stated that in the radial investigation at Toronto recent Engineer Gaby when asked why a power bill standing against the London and Port Stanley Railway of \$23,000 had not been paid, was said to have replied that it was paid, but he had no proof of this.

STORM SEWERS.
Introducing the storm sewer question, Secretary Tite stated that while Mayor Little, during the election campaign last fall, promised that all questions of public improvement should be voted on by the people he had not kept his word. The No. 2 committee taken a stand directly in opposition to this.

Ald. Ashton explained that Mayor Little had not arrived at the committee meeting until it was nearly over. He also pointed out that storm sewers are necessary in order that the city can have a clean and healthy appearance. It was finally decided to take up this question further at a special meeting to be called to discuss the election program.

Discussion of the coal situation centered around the difference in prices charged by the various dealers. It was stated that one dealer is selling coal in London for \$17. Incidentally it was noted that this particular one cannot take any further orders, while others are charging as high as \$24 a ton, and still others are selling the coal to the highest bidder.

Ald. Ashton stated that the high prices are caused by the coal brokers, who have charge of the independent supply. The result, supply is being sold at the lowest prices.

However it was decided that the right of publicity with regard to the wholesale prices of coal would be the best method of preventing the local dealers taking undue advantage of the public.

Says Ten Cases of Too High Rental Submitted

The gas, restaurant and rent questions were discussed by the members of the fair price committee, which met in the Labor Temple last evening. H. B. Ashplant, president, J. F. Thompson, secretary of the fair price committee, submitted a report on fair rents, which is as follows:

"As instructed by our last meeting letters were sent to the prime minister and City Clerk Baker. Prof. L. A. Wood, Mr. Leach and myself visited the City Council as instructed. Dr. Wood introduced the question briefly and after the secretary had cited cases of rent profiteering your deputations asked the Council to convene a public meeting to discuss every phase of the problem."

Cunningham himself endeavored to show from the secretary's figures that there was a doubt as to profiteering and that at any rate the statistics advanced could be discussed in committee and city and its importance to the world brotherhood.
