EXTRACTS FROM THE JOURNALS.

Jan. 1, 1833.

The Committee to whom was referred duty of enquiring into the best mode in

reference to St. Andrews, which he read. **Ordered**, That the said petition be received, referred to the committee on roads.

Mr. Wyer, by leave, presented a Petition of Amos E. Frye, of St. Andrews' in town of Charlotte, praying for a return of moneys paid on horses and other property insured from the United States, in November, 1864, for the Saint John and Saint Andrews Railroad, which he read.

Ordered, That the said petition be received, referred to the committee of supply.

At a meeting of Mr. Street, Ordered, That the House will on Saturday the 20th day of January inst. at 12 o'clock at noon of that day go into consideration of the petition of William Fitz William Owen, John Wilson,
