AN APPEAL FOR RELIEF OF WOMEN AND CHILDREN IN CAPE BRETON MINING TOWNS.

The following letter has been received by Mayor Hicks from Mrs. Charles Archibald, Halifax: Mayor Edw. A. Hicks, Bridgetown.

As a result of continual unemployment in a number of colliery districts of Nova Scotia and inability of families of idle miners to secure further credit there is destitution and almost starvation. I have lived in mining towns of Cape Breton for twenty-one years and know of the great suffering, especially during periods of this kind.

It is not my purpose to discuss rights or wrongs of present dispute. It seems to me it is time for Christian people to band together to send succor to helpless mothers and little ones. On behalf of those associated with me in this provincial appeal for relief I would appreciate if you would lend co-operation also request all clergymen in your town to announce through their pulpits that those interested in assisting in alleviating suffering and hunger should forward contributions at once to Hon. McCullum Grant, care of Grant, Oxbay and Company, Halifax, Nova Scotia.

SWINE CLUB TO RE-ORGANIZE AT LAWRENCETOWN.

Last year a Boys and Girls Swine Club was successfully organized and carried on at Lawrencetown. The experience in 1924 has justified a continuation of the work and the club is to be re-organized this week on Thursday afternoon at 3.30 in the Demonstration Building. Any boy or girl between the ages of ten and twenty-one within a radius of 8 miles is eligible for membership.

The main regulations are to agree to feed, manage, and care for two to five pigs of bacon type. To take part in all club meetings and attend all periods of instruction in care, feeding, management and judging of hogs.

To exhibit one pair of hogs at the Fair which will be held in the fall. Last year there were seventeen members in the club and this year indications point to an increase of at least one hundred per cent.

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GROWTH IN DAIRY INDUSTRY.

The total amount of creamery butter manufactured in the creameries of Alberta during 1924 amounts practically to 21,500,000 lbs., as compared with 17,800,000 lbs. last year. There are now 87 creameries operating, compared with 75 the previous year. The total amount of butter graded for export is over 4,000,000 lbs., compared with just over 2,000,000 lbs. in 1923. All this butter is sold outside of Canada, chiefly in Great Britain and the Orient. There has been a steady increase in the quality of both cream and butter as a result of the cream grading system.

ENCOURAGING C.P.R. EMPLOYEES

Two scholarships, covering four years' free tuition in architecture, chemical, civil, mechanical or electrical engineering at McGill University are being offered for 1925 to apprentices and other employees on the company's permanent staff by the Canadian Pacific Railway. The scholarships are also opened to sons of employees. All competitors must be under twenty-one years of age.
