CONTRACTS OPEN.

OAKVILLE, ONT.—The east pier in the harbor is to be repaired.

TWEED, ONT.—A telephone line will be built from this town to Flinton.

PARENHAM, ONT.—A new Roman Catholic church is to be erected here.

WINDSOR, ONT.—The electric light company will shortly increase its plant.

PETERBORO, ONT.—A new school house will be erected in section 2, North Monahan.

PORT ELGIN, ONT.—The sum of \$2,500 will be expended in dredging the harbor this year.

RAT PORTAGE, ONT.—The sum of \$60,000 will be expended in repairs to the smelting works.

BERLIN, ONT.—Messrs. Walper Bros. are calling for tenders for the erection of a new hotel.

HOLLAND LANDING, ONT.—An iron bridge, to cost \$1,500, is to be built on the York Road.

KINGARF ONT.—Mr. E. A. Hall is calling for tenders for the erection of a new brick church at this place.

HUMBERSTONE, ONT.—Messrs. Dickinson & Sues are preparing plans for several new buildings in Ridgeway.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—Mr. F. Micault is having the site prepared for the erection of his three storey hotel.

ST. JOHN, N.B.—The city council has decided to advertise for 700 feet of fabric hose and 300 feet of rubber hose.

METCALF, ONT.—Mr. W. S. Carter is calling for tenders up to the 16th inst. for the construction of the Watt dam.

SARNIA, ONT.—A mission chapel will be erected in the Fourth Ward by the congregation of the Congregational church.

UNIONVILLE, ONT.—Tenders will be received by Mr. Davison, Markham, up to the 23rd inst., for the erection of a new school.

DUNDALK, ONT.—Messrs. Post & Holmes, architects, Toronto, have prepared plans for a Roman Catholic church to be erected in this town.

OIL SPRINGS, ONT.—The town has granted Mr. Hayne, of Bridgen, a bonus of \$2,000 and a site for a new roller flour mill of fifty barrels capacity.

THREE RIVERS, QUE.—Tenders are wanted for the purchase of debentures to the amount of \$78,006. L. L. Desaulniers, secretary and treasurer.

PREMBROKE, ONT.—The C. P. R. will likely construct a number of large stone culverts along the line between this village and Mattawa during the coming summer.

LONDON, ONT.—The plans for the rebuilding of the Talbot street school building have been prepared, and are now awaiting approval by the Board of Education.

ST. JOHN, N.B.—The ratepayers will vote on a by-law granting the Forchert North American Tobacco Co., the sum of \$15,000 to establish their factory in this town.

GALT, ONT.—The Grand Trunk has decided to replace the present wooden bridge over Mill Creek, near the Dumfries mills, Galt, with an iron structure during the coming summer.

THORNHURV, ONT.—The town council have taken steps to compel the county council of the county of Grey to assist in the construction of a bridge over the Beaver river in this village.

ACHIL, ONT.—A Roman Catholic church is to be erected at a cost of about \$5,000 to take the place of the building lately destroyed by fire. Post & Holmes, architects Toronto, are preparing the plans.

ACTON, ONT.—The council will be asked at its next meeting to provide the sum of \$5,500 for the erection and furnishing of a new school building.—A new house is to be erected on John Mathew's property on Mill street.

WHITBY, ONT.—At a recent meeting of the town council, a committee was appointed to select a site for the new custom house and post office, an appropriation for which has been granted by the Dominion Government.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—A resolution has been passed by the Property Committee of the Council recommending that the Dominion Government be requested to build a post office on Keele st., the town giving the necessary land.

HALIFAX, N.S.—The city council has decided to expend the sum of \$200,000 in laying a duplicate water main.—Mr. W. R. Meturdy has purchased property on Coubourg road on which to erect two cottages during the coming summer.

ROMNEY, ONT.—The ratepayers have earned a by-law granting a bonus of \$10,000 to the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway for the construction of their line from Leamington through the townships of Romney, Ilburoy East and Raleigh.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C.—Mr. G. W. Grant, architect, has prepared plans for a new building to be erected by the Freemasons on the corner of Lorne and Columbia streets. Mr. Towle, architect, has prepared plan for the erection of a new hall for the Oddfellows' Society.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—A deputation will shortly interview the Dominion Government with regard to the granting of a subsidy for the construction of the Brantford and Tisonburg railway to Port Burwell.—A movement has been commenced towards securing railway connection with Lake Erie.

GUELPH, ONT.—Plans are being prepared for a new skating and curling rink.—The City Council have decided to erect a new firehall, at a cost of \$9,000.—The erection of a new building for the Second Baptist church will be commenced shortly.—A deputation representing the City Council and Fat Stock club recently waited upon the Agricultural and Arts Association at Toronto, regarding the erection of joint buildings in this city.

VANCOUVER, B.C.—The congregation of Zion Church have not yet selected a site for their new building.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company are now calling for tenders for the erection
