

V I E N N A.

On the 15th of May, died her Imperial Majesty the Empress Dowager of Germany. This Princess was daughter of the late Charles III. King of Spain, was born Novr. 24, 1745, and married Aug. 5, 1765 to the late Emperor, then Grand Duke of Tuscany, to whom she bore 17 children,—14 of whom are still living.

Notwithstanding the death of the Empress, it is said, the Coronation of Francis, as King of Hungary, was to take place at Ofen on the 6th of June last; and his Coronation, as Emperor, soon after, at Franckfort.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

May 29. Letters from the territory south of the Ohio, mention the growing hostility of disposition prevalent among some of the Creeks and Chickamogga Indians, against the frontier settlements of the United States in that quarter. Twenty-two persons were killed in the Cumberland settlement about the beginning of April, and two carried off. Fifteen miles from Rogersville, a Shawanese Indian had killed and scalped three children, and taken the mother prisoner.

June 2. *Knoxville, Territory south of the Ohio.* The Indians are still troublesome; they attacked judge Campbell on his way from Court; there were four others in company. But all escaped. Two boys were killed about twelve miles from this place, and a man fired at by four Indians—each ball passed through his clothes, but did no further mischief.

The Governor has been in their towns. A numerous representation of the chiefs and warriors from the lower towns on Chickamogga attended: they now shew signs of a desire for peace; how far they are to be depended upon you may guess—they are Indians.

June 22. Letters from Red-Stone mention, that great numbers of people who had resorted there with a view of going down the Ohio to Kentucky this Spring, have been unable to put their design in execution, on account of the danger from Indian depredations. Most of these are consequently in great distress, scattered about Red-Stone, having expended their little all. Two boats only had attempted to go down the river, both of which were taken, and the people either killed or made prisoners by the savages.

New-York State.

A great ferment has lately been excited in this state by some difficulty which occurred in the election of a Governor; one party holding George Clinton to be duly elected, and another, John Jay. It appears that upon the close of the poll Mr. Jay had a majority of votes; but the votes of the county of Otsego, which were in his favor, have been set aside by the canvassers, because the commission of the Sheriff had expired before the return was made.

Poughkeepsie June 21.—Extract of a letter from a Gentleman in Kingston, to his friend in this City.

On the morning of the 14th instant information was received here that seven of the Canvassers have certified Mr. Clinton's re-election to the office of Governor—the returns from Otsego were rejected unopened, and that
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
